

AMERICANS FOR AMERICAN JOBS IS WORKERS' AIM

A definite move to limit the giving of American jobs to Americans was initiated here today in a communication to Mayor E. M. Wilson from Frank Oliver, executive secretary of the American Employees' administration, seeking organization of local employees in a campaign for elimination of alien employees by American institutions, establishments and projects, where practical. The same are to be replaced by American citizens.

The national headquarters for the administration are at 740 South Broadway, Los Angeles, Cal.

"With hundreds of thousands of aliens employed in the United States, with more being admitted continually, who have no intention of becoming citizens, while our citizens, both male and female, are walking the streets looking for employment, to feed their families, it is time that the American employer and employee cooperate to remedy this condition and discourage further immigration at this time," Mr. Oliver states.

"We are calling upon all American employees to patriotically do their duty in assisting in a solution of this economic trouble by supporting the President of the United States, patronize business institutions that are operating under the National Recovery administration and collectively assist those less fortunate, the unemployed, in acts of kindness and deeds of charity. Constructive action is of paramount importance, due to the sinister influence of radical foreign communistic agitators, who are seeking to overthrow the government.

"The American Employees' administration further advocates the national establishment of educational, vocational, guidance agencies, schools of efficiency, rehabilitation and self-help institutions, for those who must again enter industry and be rehabilitated; the scientific collection and distribution of the penniless, widows, children and unemployed of millions of tons of vegetables, fruits and other products that are left to useless decay." Branch AEA headquarters are being established in cities and towns throughout the United States, to work out a program for permanent national recovery, and a large number of people experienced in organizational work will be employed in this state, according to information received from national headquarters.

CULINARY CRAFT....

BEAUTY VIA VITAMINS

Did you ever think that the texture and attractive service of certain green foods has a lot to do with your

appetite variations? Actually, this is true. Seeds, strings, skins, careless cutting, etc., are all likely to detract from the appeal to one's taste, and often turn really good food into so much wasted effort.

Then, there is the matter of variety in service. If you serve the favorite dish of the family too often it soon becomes most unpopular. Also, serving two or three similar foods at the same or succeeding meals is a grand way to kill their favor. Just today a young lady told me that she disliked chicken tamales thoroughly because in her "house" at school they had been served it so regularly that she was sickened of it for life. Some thoughtless manager considered it a fine dish, no doubt, but lacked foresight to save it from the evil results of over-production. Right here should be the opportune time to warn against too many so-called "creamed" dishes. It seems to me that we are almost "creamed" to death these days! Now that spring and vegetables are coming in, surely there will be no need for "creaming" them. Their freshness and fine texture are so much more enjoyable if cooked and served in their own juices.

In the way of variation we offer these suggestions:

- Salt.**
Bake medium sized potatoes. Cut in half lengthwise and remove pulp. Whip this with butter and salt to taste then add the cooked spinach and refill the shells. Top each half with a piece of bacon and return to the oven to crisp the bacon. Serve immediately.
- Carrot-Pineapple Salad**
2 tablespoons acidulated gelatin.
1/2 cup cold water.
2 cups hot, cooked carrots (diced finely).
1 9-ounce can crushed pineapple.
1 orange, grated rind, and juice.
1 lemon, juice.
1/2 teaspoon salt.
1/2 cup nut meals if desired.
- Pea Souffle**
1 tablespoon butter.
2 tablespoons flour.
1/2 cup milk.
1/2 teaspoon salt.
1 cup small cooked peas.
2 eggs.
1/4 cup grated cheese.
- Sweet Carrots**
Slice carrots very thin—shred them. Place in a flat bottomed saucepan. Add 2 tablespoons butter, 1 teaspoon salt and 1 tablespoon sugar for 2 cups of carrots. Cover tightly and cook on low heat for 20 minutes then cook on retained heat of element for another 20 minutes.
- Brussels Sprouts**
Remove all wilted leaves then soak the sprouts in cold water 15 minutes. Drain and cook in boiling, salted water about 20 minutes. Drain and serve with a little butter.
- Tomato-Potato Puff**
3 cups mashed potatoes.
2 cups canned tomatoes.
2 tablespoons butter (melt).
1/2 teaspoon salt.
3 egg whites, beaten.
Combine potatoes and tomatoes, season with salt and melted butter.

AUTOISTS PAYING HEAVY FUEL TAX

WASHINGTON, March 15.—(AP)—Hearing on the house tax revision measure were completed today by the senate finance committee after Chairman Harrison had given assurance the federal government plans to abandon its gasoline tax as soon as the condition of the treasury permits.

The committee hopes to present the completed bill to the senate next Monday.

The final witnesses advocated the elimination of the 1 cent a gallon gasoline tax.

Fayette E. Down, for the American petroleum industries committee, and Harvey L. Cobb, for the American Motorists association, said the combined federal and state gasoline levies amounted to a 35 per cent retail sales tax.

NEW CHARCOAL METHOD FOUND

EUGENE, Ore., March 15.—(AP) A new method of making charcoal, which works on the principle of both keeping your cake and eating it, was announced today at the University of Oregon.

A stream of chipped wood is fed into a new type of rotating cylinder. Heat drives the gases out of the wood and these gases are burned to make the cylinder hot enough to carbonize the wood.

A little "starting" heat is required, but most of the heat is supplied by the wood chips which are turning into carbon. The process was invented by O. F. Stafford, head of the chemistry department.

CHURCH WILL HONOR PIONEER MINISTERS

PORTLAND, Ore., March 15.—(AP) Ministers of pioneer days and members of their families will be honored guests here Sunday morning at the Centenary-Wilbur Methodist church in a special service honoring the old circuit riders.

Dr. Carl Gregg Doney, president of Willamette university, will make the address.

Retired ministers and their families will enjoy a basket lunch at noon in the church dining room.

CUBAN LIQUOR ENTRY UNLIMITED MARCH 21

WASHINGTON, March 15.—(AP)—Unlimited importation of alcoholic beverages from Cuba will be permitted from March 21 to April 7.

This was made known today by Joseph H. Choate, Jr., federal alcohol administrator.

It is in line with President Roosevelt's recent order to lift restrictions on imports so that the price of liquor may be reduced.

LINN COUNTY SEES AID BY SALES TAX

ALBANY, Ore.—(Sp)—The state and general property tax in Linn county will be cut approximately 25 per cent by the 1 1/2 per cent sales tax if it carries at the May primaries, according to a statement made by County Assessor W. A. Templeton, speaking before the Albany Realtor's association.

Templeton's figures were based upon the state tax commission's estimates which show that the tax will raise \$4,000,000, all of which will be used to reduce property taxes in every county now raised to support the schools.

The law specifically provides that funds accruing from the sales tax shall be used exclusively for school support and that the same amount shall be deducted from property taxes throughout the state. Linn county would benefit by a reduction of \$132,000 in property taxes, Templeton said.

GOVERNMENT TO BUILD GRAND COULEE PROJECT

WASHINGTON, March 15.—(AP)—Secretary Ickes, public works administrator, today announced the Grand Coulee project on the Columbia river would be built and operated by the federal government and not by the state of Washington or one of its agencies, as previously planned.

The project is estimated to cost \$63,000,000 for the initial development. A preliminary allotment of \$15,000,000 has been made.

PORTLAND WILL HAVE COMMODITY EXCHANGE

PORTLAND, Ore., March 15.—(AP)—Stanley E. Sample, manager of the Portland merchants' exchange, revealed today that plans are underway to establish a Pacific northwest commodity exchange here, with trading sections in wheat, oats, barley, hops, wool, butter, eggs, poultry, apples, potatoes and onions.

Committees composed of representatives of the several businesses involved will be appointed at once to work out plans.
