The negative was upheld by the Medford team, Virginia Hammond and Richard Thierolf. The judge, Rev. Joseph Knotts, declared the negative winners.

The other debate was held in the Ashland junior high. The Medford affirmative team, Billy Wilson and Shirley Tuttle, was accompanied by the coach, Mrs. Guy Young. The Ashland negative team was composed of Jack Parsons and Charlotte Walters. The judge, Mr. Fuller, awarded the decision to the negative.

This ends debating for the local ninth grade team for this year.
