Paris is saying it with "accents" for Easter. The blue wool spring coat (left) takes much of its charm from a scarf, gloves and deep cuffs of royal blue-and-white striped jersey, with the ensemble completed by a colored straw sailor with a blue band. Designed by Molyneux, it has patch pockets, collarless line buttoning straight down the front, and a navy blue link leather belt. Pearl seashell buttons give a striking note to the spring frock of soft gray wool (center), designed by Marcel Rochas. The soft shoulder line with fullness just below, high neckline and belt with pearl seashell buckle identify it smartly.



The costume at the right, designed by Worth, is a navy blue wool suit with blouse of white printed organdy topped off with a frilled collar and a big bow. Accents are added by the wide-brimmed, blue banded hat of natural colored straw, the gloves with gold-link backs and the umbrella. Accents are of prime importance in spring's fashion picture, with necklines, waistlines and hemlines the basic problems.

## LANDON H. TUCKER RITES WEDNESDAY

Landon Hanes Tucker, beloved pioneer resident of Medford, where he had lived for the past 32 years, passed away at the family residence, 601 Dakota avenue, Sunday evening, after an illness of the past six years. Mr. Tucker had been in exceedingly good health, before this time, not regarding his advanced age of 87. He was born at Summerset, Kentucky, September 11, 1859, spending his early life, and gaining his early education in Kentucky. At the age of 21, he crossed the plains with his parents into Arkansas, living there for 15 years, before starting on the long journey to eastern Oregon by ox team, taking about six months for the trip. They came through the Snake river country, but were not bothered by the Indians. He made the trip at the time Custer was defeated in the Indian wars. Mr. Tucker spent many years in eastern Oregon, coming to Medford in 1902. In 1914, he was united in marriage to Millie Putney Gage in this city. Mr. Tucker was one of the few surviving members of the Civil war, enlisting at Columbia county, seat of Adair county, Kentucky, in August, 1862, at Lincoln's last call. He was mustered in a Glasgow, Barron county, Ky., in 1863 and mustered out at Louisville, Kentucky near Christmas time in 1864. Surviving are his widow, Mrs. Millie Tucker of this city, three daughters, Mrs. Weldon Hartley, of Jacksonville, Ore., Mrs. Eyle Henderson of Medford, Mrs. Etta Wilson of Berkeley, Calif.; two sons, Dave of Joseph, Ore., and Ben of Enterprise, Ore.; two step-daughters, Mrs. Earl Isaacs of Ashland, Ore., Mrs. Earl Conklin of Tacoma, Wash., and one sister living in eastern Oregon. He was a member of the old Christian church at Phoenix, Oregon, and the O. A. R. of Medford. Funeral services will be conducted from the Peril Funeral Home Wednesday afternoon at 2 o'clock, Rev.

## SCOUT LEADERSHIP TRAINING COURSE OPENING TONIGHT

A large number of men are expected to attend the training course which starts at 7:30 tonight at the Roosevelt school gymnasium. The course, conducted under the auspices of the Grater Lake Area Council, Boy Scouts of America, will include eight evening sessions and two outdoor sessions. All men are invited to avail themselves of the opportunity to become better acquainted with the Boy Scout program. Fathers of boys will find the course as helpful as the scoutmaster of a troop. Men will find the training very enjoyable as well as instructive. M. N. Hogan, chairman of the leadership training committee for the council, will open the session by explaining the purposes and objectives of the training course. This will be followed by an explanation of the "Scouting objectives and program." More than 225,000 men are actively connected with scouting and more than 825,000 boys are in the work. A. O. Soderberg, scout executive, will present the topic, "Character and How It Is Influenced." The subject is presented in an interesting and informative way and will be easily understood. The group will be divided into patrols of eight, each patrol having a patrol leader. Scoutmasters and oth-

ers experienced in Scouting will act as patrol leaders. There will be inter-patrol competition, which increases the fun and fellowship. Group singing will also be a part of the program. No man taking the course assumes any obligation to become a Scout leader and there are no costs. If it is convenient, the man taking the course should own or borrow a Boy Scout Handbook. Men who have not registered may do so at this evening's meeting.

## CROSSING CRASH CASE UNDER WAY

The \$25,000 damage suit of Annie Turpin of Klamath Falls against the Southern Pacific railroad, and J. C. Cline and Jack McNerny, truck operators, for "mental suffering and physical pain," opened in circuit court this morning before Judge H. D. Norton, with the selection of a jury. The suit is based upon a railroad crossing crash, January 5, 1933, near Mt. Hebron, Calif. The truck in which Mrs. Turpin, a "hitch-hiker" was riding as a "non-paying guest" was hit by a Weed-Klamath Falls passenger train. Cline and McNerny, the truck operators, invited the woman to ride when they saw her walking down the highway, the complaint answer cites. Prospective jurors were asked if they entertained any prejudice against the Southern Pacific, if they were prejudiced against hitch-hiker, and their view on the law of "contributory negligence." The case is expected to take two

days, and most of the witnesses for both sides hail from Klamath county. The plaintiff is represented by Attorney A. W. Schaub and U. S. Balandine of Klamath Falls, and Attorney Frank P. Farrell of this city; the defense by Attorney L. O. Hampson of Portland, and Attorneys George M. Roberts and Robert Hammond of this city.
