

AMELIA PUTNAM GIVES VIEWS ON AIR MAIL BILL

WASHINGTON, March 20.—(AP)—Amelia Earhart Putnam, transatlantic aviatrix, told the senate postoffice committee today she would like to see a permanent air mail bill "rolled through" congress as speedily as possible with not too many restrictions against further development of the industry.

Speaking plainly with intermittent smiles and half chuckles, the slender, boyish-appearing young woman who flew the Atlantic alone suggested several changes in the measure because she said she was "deeply interested in the future of aviation" and wanted to give it "every chance to develop."

"Aviation should not be restricted too much until its maturity is reached," she said. "The industry is still young and it should not be killed before it develops."

"Mrs. Putnam said competitive bidding should be required, at least in the beginning, and proposed allowing the interstate commerce commission or some other federal agency to bar bidding from companies which interlock with holding corporations and aircraft manufacturing concerns."

would go to Washington tonight in response to a request from President Roosevelt.

"The automobile manufacturers were advised by General Johnson this afternoon that the president desired to see them tomorrow," said a statement issued after an all-day session.

"Accordingly a committee of the directors of the National Automobile Chamber of Commerce, who have been meeting in New York will go to Washington tonight in response to the president's summons."

Say Strike Reason Vailed.
"Mr. Green and Mr. Collins of the American Federation of Labor (William Green is president of the federation and Collins is in charge of strike activities in the Detroit area) have admitted that the strike is not for hours and wages, and said that they have called the strike because of the charges which they make that the manufacturers have not complied with the law."

"The manufacturers assert that they have complied with the law in letter and spirit and that Mr. Green is using his official position in NIRA and on the national labor board to foment the strike in the hope the men will believe the government is behind the American Federation of Labor in its efforts to organize them."

This statement was issued after there had been every indication that attempts by Administrator Johnson to bring about peace had failed to accomplish their purpose.

NAZI PROPAGANDA PROBE AUTHORIZED

WASHINGTON, March 20.—(AP)—A congressional investigation of Nazi propaganda activities in the United States was authorized today by the house, 168 to 31.

It adopted a resolution by Chairman Dickstein (D., N. Y.) of the immigration committee authorizing the speaker to name a committee of seven to inquire into "the extent, character and objects of Nazi propaganda activities in the United States" and "the diffusion within the United States of subversive propaganda that is instigated from foreign countries and attacks the principle of the form of government as guaranteed by our constitution."

SWITZ AND WIFE REVEAL ACTIVITY TO FRENCH JUDGE

the alleged spy ring to 15.

After the examination of the switzer, the magistrate announced he had signed warrants for the arrest of persons whose alleged connection with the band had not been suspected before the Americans were questioned.

Police said they expected the roundup to put 25 persons in prison when it is completed.

The new prisoners are Colonel Dumoulin, alias Charrae, retired French army officer and proprietor of a military publication; M. Aubry, engineer at an army powder factory and his wife; M. Vatrolosreich, a Rumanian-born naturalized French chemist attached to the National Institute of Biology; Mile. Riva Davidovici, a Rumanian dentist.

Girl Suspect Files
Police, bearing warrants which they said were based on information obtained from the switzer, also sought a young Besarabian girl student, married to a Frenchman, but found she had fled.

A mass of documents, including secret codes, photographic plates, films and photographs seized in raids, was added to alleged espionage material previously recovered.

Many of the documents, police said, deal with plans to protect France against gas attacks and to mobilize industry in Paris in time of war, including production estimates for all factories.

Switzerland, the officers said, was a clearing house for distribution of the secrets.

Frameup Claimed
Switz previously had admitted, they said, that he mailed a photographic film to Switzerland for a "chance acquaintance" but protested he had been "framed."

Trails of the suspects were slowly uncovered by quizzing 180 persons in 250 separate investigations by secret

and general police and the counter-espionage service, in cooperation with the American and British detectives.

Mile. Davidovici was charged with acting as the liaison between the alleged band and agents of Germany and Russia, receiving and distributing letters from those involved.

The band, said police, had a book-keeping department whose records show Dumoulin and Aubry received 5,000 francs (approximately \$325) a week and Vatrolosreich 3,000 francs (about \$195) a week.

Secret documents of the Superior War school were seized at Dumoulin's home, they said.

Aubry is accused of copying and sending documents to foreign countries and Vatrolosreich with supplying French plans for defense against gas attacks.

The missing Besarabian girl is charged with developing and printing a secret code for films.

Color Code Suspected
Many photographic papers bore spots of different colors which police believed to be a code.

Police charged incidentally that Dumoulin's magazine tended to incite non-commissioned officers against their superiors.

The American consulate made a full report to Washington, based on newspaper accounts.

French authorities maintained official secrecy, declining to disclose details of the supposed espionage against the United States, or what took place when the switzer was quizzed.

Another woman and her husband were reported arrested at the home of Davidovici, making seven seized in today's raids.

MANY PICTURE AGATES IN ANDERS COLLECTION

Water agates, in which pictures of men, women and children may easily be traced, were brought to Medford this morning by C. W. Anders of the Willow Springs section, who was in the city attending to business matters.

Anders, who has a large collection of the stones, polishes them himself. One of the agates had several pictures in it, including one of George Washington.

KIN OF AGED MUST HELP IN SUPPORT IS PENSION RULE

SALEM, Ore., March 20.—(AP)—The old age pension law provides that parents, children and brothers and sisters if able to do so must support indigent persons, and these persons if found with other possible support are not eligible for the pension.

Attorney General I. H. Van Winkle ruled in an opinion handed Sherman S. Smith, district attorney of Josephine county.

Under the civil law one exception is made to this rule, in the case of married females where the county has no legal right to compel them to support indigent parents "while their husbands live." Under the criminal code, however, all persons able to support indigent relatives and fail to do so may be punished by jail sentence and fine, under which no exception is made.

Explaining the situation under the exception, Van Winkle declared that "if an applicant for an old age pension has a married daughter whose husband is alive and who is financially able, but refuses to provide for the care and maintenance of such applicant, the county court would be precluded from compelling her to do so by an action of law, * * * but inasmuch as a mandatory duty is imposed upon the counties to provide for the care and maintenance of its poor persons * * * it would be the duty of the old age pension commission to grant the pension applied for, * * * although the daughter may be subject to criminal prosecution."

COL. HOFER BURIED IN PORTLAND TODAY

PORTLAND, March 20.—(AP)—Funeral services were held here today for Colonel E. Hofer, 79, former Salem publisher, who died at his home here Sunday. He is survived by his widow, Wynona Hofer, two sons, Robert and Laurence, and a daughter, Mrs. Allan A. Bynon.

ATTORNEY TELLS ROTARY CLUB OF GREATEST TRIAL

As an interesting pre-Easter program for the Medford Rotary club, City Attorney Frank Farrell presented a talk upon the "The Greatest Trial in History" at a luncheon meeting today at the Medford hotel. In this enlightening address, Mr. Farrell discussed the legal angles of the trial of Jesus leading up to his crucifixion.

Throughout the tangled legal procedure, Pontius Pilate was clearly "on the spot," the speaker said, and in his final action in turning Jesus over to the Jews to be crucified the Roman was motivated by political and "policy" reasons. The initial two trials before the prejudiced Sanhedrin were farces in which usual legal procedure was disregarded. Original charges were changed first to blasphemy, then to treason and when Jesus as defendant appeared before Pilate in accordance with Roman law, he was acquitted.

When popular clamor again forced Pontius Pilate's hand, Mr. Farrell told the Rotarians how the case was submitted to Herod who also cleared Jesus of the accusation, after which Pilate again was called upon to take action. The Roman again acquitted Jesus with "chastisement" which did not appease his many enemies, and Pilate, for political reasons, turned the man whom he had twice acquitted over to the multitude to be crucified. Mr. Farrell explained, in this interesting legal slant upon the famous "case" how all principles of law and usual legal procedure were discarded.
