RIO DE JANEIRO, March 20.—(AP)—The newspaper aote in a dispatch from Manaus today said a band of Janapery Indians near Gurishu, Brazil, posing as friendly, lured six rubber workers to a remote spot and killed them with arrows.

Other Indians then attacked the workers' camp of 22 employes, the dispatch said. Only eight, including three wounded, reached Manaus.
