

### 3 CITY PROJECTS ARE FAVORED FOR CWA COMPLETION

#### Airport Improvement, East Main Curve Elimination, Court Street Work Advised In Report to Council

Improvement of the Medford airport, elimination of the curve in East Main street and completion of work on North Court street are the projects recommended by the local CWA committee for completion in Medford under the restricted labor quota.

City Superintendent Fred Scheffel has informed the city council in a report.

All CWA projects, as previously announced, will be discontinued on April 1. They are now operated by drastically reduced crews.

Other work accomplished and hoped for was reported by Mr. Scheffel, as follows: Construction of Roxy Ann road has been completed and a rough mountain road built with bull dozers from the old Westerlund store to station 310, approximately six miles. It is hoped the bull dozers will reach the camp ground before April 1.

"On the Bear Creek project, we hope to complete the rock wall along the west side of the creek to the north line of the Merrick camp ground," Mr. Scheffel stated.

### CHISELERS AGREE TO RESPECT CODE

PORTLAND, March 22.—(AP)—Edgar Freed, Oregon compliance director for NRA, announced today that three Portland retail mercantile establishments, accused of violating NRA fair practice provisions, have agreed to abandon their erring ways and have returned to full NRA compliance.

A fourth firm that refused to comply by the Wednesday deadline set by Freed, will be dealt with by the NRA compliance division at Washington, D. C., to which Freed has sent recommendation for summary action and possible blue eagle removal.

Freed said the major violation in the case of the three stores was selling below cost. He did not disclose the nature of the violation charged to the fourth.

### HAYS EDICT WILL CUT CRIME FILMS

NEW YORK, March 22.—(AP)—The action of Will Hays, president of the motion picture producers and distributors of America, banning any film production based on the life of John Dillinger, notorious outlaw, may mark a new era in gang pictures.

It was called today "the most definite action ever taken against pictures delineating criminal exploits" by J. J. McCarthy, chairman of the advertising advisory council of the Hays organization.

"It undoubtedly will tend to increase the production of criminal pictures," McCarthy said.

### NRA UNDERMINED BY STEEL CODE ASSERTS BORAH

#### Complete Redrafting Urged—Restoration of Anti-Trust Laws to Protect Small Business Man Need

WASHINGTON, March 22.—(AP)—Senator Borah in the senate today said the steel code was "undermining the NRA" and urged its complete redrafting, as well as restoration of the anti-trust laws, to protect the small business man, labor and consumers against "economic feudalism."

Calling attention to the trade commission report saying the steel code was under the domination of the big producers and price fixing was being indulged in, Borah said there was a "restlessness through the entire labor world" and "this restlessness will manifest itself more generally as time goes on unless these things are remedied."

Labor Suffers. Assaulting allegedly monopolistic tendencies under NRA, he said whenever there was rise in the price of labor or wages these "combinations and monopolies take away from the workmen all possible advantages by reason of the rise in wages."

Borah urged an immediate committee report on his proposal to restore operation of the anti-trust laws and said this would "in no wise conflict with a fair execution of the national recovery act."

"Congress should restore the anti-trust law," he said, "so as to enable those administering this law to enforce it against just such things as revealed in this commission report."

He said the small business man was being eliminated under recovery codes and "under cover of the law."

Some of the NRA support, he asserted, comes from business concerns which under it are permitted to engage in monopolistic practices which otherwise would be barred.

Coast Firms Hit. Attacking "Pittsburg-plus" methods of steel pricing, Borah read letters from Pacific Coast firms, indicating they were forced to pay the equivalent of freight charges from Pittsburg on steel made on the coast.

The steel code authority, he charged, is dictated by the large companies.

Borah likened the large and small manufacturers under the steel code to a snake killing a pig in a cage.

"The minute the independent business man touches the interest of the larger combine he is put out of business," he said.

Borah said a small business man under the code had no chance because "back of it all is a board of directors made up of officers of the steel institute and with the power of initiative."

### CANDIDATE FAVORS LICENSED GAMING

PORTLAND, March 22.—(AP)—Advocating the "licensing of every form of gambling under a local plan, with strict regulation and heavy penalties for violation," Sam St. Williams of Portland today announced he is a candidate for the Democratic nomination as governor.

Williams, resident of Portland for 23 years, two years ago was the Democratic nominee for sheriff of Multnomah county.

He advocates legalized establishment of "restricted districts;" creation of a state constabulary to function under command of the adjutant general, with state armories as headquarters; abolition of the liquor control law with package distribution by private agencies, and construction of power transmission lines from Bonneville dam to all parts of the state.
