

SEA CREATURES TO BE STUDIED AT NEW DEPTHS

Scientist Develops 'Diving Ball' Capable of Withstanding Pressure Nearly Half Mile Under Surface

WASHINGTON, D. C.—(Sp.)—Continuation next summer of the unique deep-sea investigations of Dr. William Beebe under a grant of funds by the National Geographic society of Washington has been announced by Dr. Gilbert Grosvenor, president of the society. Dr. Beebe, who is director of the department of scientific research of the New York Zoological society, and a noted oceanographic naturalist, has developed during the last few years an entirely new method of undersea investigation which permits men to descend safely to depths which hitherto could not be reached.

WILL EMPLOY 100 IN FOREST CAMPS

Word has been received at the offices of the Rogue River National forest that authorization has been made for the establishment of four blaster rust control camps in the forest, which will give employment to about 100 men for three months. Karl L. Janouch, forestry supervisor, said today.

The work will start two or three weeks after vegetation has advanced sufficiently for identification, he stated.

All persons in these camps will be employed through the federal employment agent, Lewis Ulrich. Mr. Janouch said, and announced that no applications whatever will be received at the forest service office.

ROADS NOW OPEN TO LAKE O' THE WOODS

Two roads to Lake of the Woods, via Ashland and Dead Indian, also Butte Falls and Fish lake, have been opened by the forest service to travel, Karl L. Janouch, supervisor of the forest, announced today.

Snow has been pushed off, on the Dead Indian roadway, Mr. Janouch said, but recommended anyone taking that route into the lake, take chains. There is no snow at the lake, he said.

No Air Tubes to Surface. Furnishing air from the surface to the great depths reached by the bathysphere is impracticable. The observers are sealed into the ball, and an automatic valve steadily releases a supply of oxygen. Chemicals exposed in racks absorb moisture and carbon dioxide. At the end of the dive the observers are living in an atmosphere of slightly compressed air.

During Dr. Beebe's descents in 1930 and 1932 a number of forms of sea life not known before were discovered. Many of the strange creatures were found to possess glowing and flashing light organs which help them in their battle for life in the depths to which no sunlight ever penetrates.

Dr. Beebe expects to add many new discoveries this year, and with the aid of additional and new apparatus, it is hoped to prolong the dives to four and even five hours in order that detailed observations can be made on the wholly unknown activities and habits of deep sea creatures. As to the possibilities for pushing farther into the sea depths, he has written: "Next to going to Mars, there seems nothing more exciting and unpredictable."

In the past, the deep sea diving investigations have been carried on from laboratories made available by the British government on tiny Nonsuch Island, of the Bermudas. This islet has recently been set aside for a government school, but this development will not in any way hamper the new expedition. It will make its headquarters on the mainland near Nonsuch at Dr. Beebe's new, perfectly equipped laboratory near the Bermuda biological station, and will carry on its underwater investigations in the same area used in past years. The work will start early in July.

ROLPH ASKS AID TO HALT STRIKE

SAN FRANCISCO, March 22.—(AP)—Governor James Rolph, Jr., today sent a personal telegram to Hugh Johnson, NRA administrator at Washington, in an effort to halt the impending strike of 12,000 longshoremen on the Pacific coast tomorrow.

Governor Rolph requested Johnson to obtain a ruling from Attorney General Homer Cummings as to whether the industrial recovery act applied to the "closed shop," a point of dispute between the International Longshoremen's association and the employers.

GERMAN ORIGIN OF GREEK ARTS RESEARCH GOAL

Ancient Cultures Traced in Effort to Prove Nazi Idea That Civilization Took Root in Nordic Soil

BERLIN.—(AP)—Learned German professors, vying with each other to find scientific basis for the Nazi idea that civilization had its roots in Nordic soil, are tracing ancient cultures to Germanic origins.

Time-honored theories are being thrown overboard. The old belief that mankind spread outward from Asia has been discarded by many of them as a fable.

Instead, Prof. Carl Schuchhardt, noted Berlin archaeologist, claims it was the Germanic migration from northern Europe that founded the Mycenaean culture in ancient Greece as far back as 2000 B. C.

In the scientific periodical *Forschungen und Fortschritte* (Research and Progress) Professor Schuchhardt used a wealth of detail to support his theory.

He declared that the old Achaeans built square houses similar to those of the northern Germans. The Greek besiegers of Troy used much the same fighting methods as did these ancient Germans, and Homer's conception of the Realm of Shades is purely Nordic, he claimed.

Heathen Germans lauded the virtues of the heathen Germans are frequently held up to emulation.

That they were by no means barbarians, but highly civilized people even according to the newest ideas, is claimed by Prof. Gustav Neckel. "They were," he writes, "unspolled by delusions about all men being equal and free from false notions about materialism and idealism."

The leadership principle with them was the dominant feature, far removed from the oriental notion of kings and emperors ruling "by the grace of God."

Baron Eudard von der Heydt, prominent banker and ethnologist, lecturing on early Germanic history, even traced a connection of old German art with central Asiatic and early Chinese art.

Book Held Forgery
Hot controversy among savants has been stirred up over the so-called Oera Linda Book, otherwise known as the Frisian Bible, supposed to contain ancient chronicles of old Ger-

manic history, usages, etc., going back to 2193 B. C.

This book, which was first spoken of in Holland about 60 years ago, was re-edited by Prof. Hermann Wirth, whose theories of the Nordic origin of everything that is worth while, now are being widely accepted in Nazi circles.

Four professors of the German Institute of Breslau university have issued a signed statement, confirming an earlier pronouncement by leading Dutch savants, that the Oera Linda Book is a fake.

The statement says in part: "Now that all classes, we are happy to observe, are manifesting enthusiastic interest in the ancient Germanic ideals, we must take care that these national ideals shall not be blamished or made ridiculous abroad by such forgeries."

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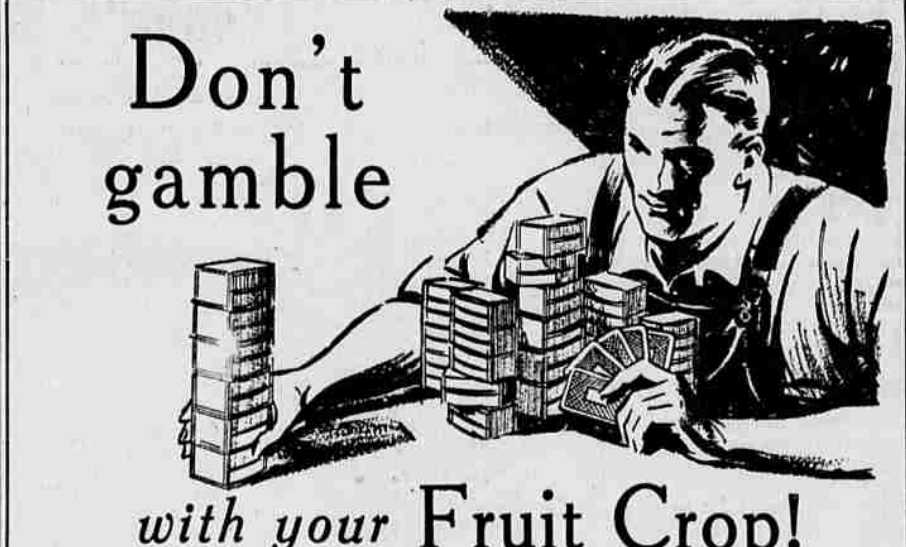
