CORVALLIS, March 22.—(P)—W. A. Schoenfeld, dean of agriculture at Oregon State college, has been asked to serve as an observer for the national agricultural adjustment administration at a butter marketing agreement hearing to be held in Salem tomorrow.

Chester C. Davis, administrator of the farm act, today wired Dean Schoenfeld requesting him to attend the hearing "as our observer-appraiser, and report developments to us."

Dean Schoenfeld has represented the AAA in federal marketing agreement hearings several times in the northwest.

Tomorrow's hearing in Salem will be before Max Gehlar, director of the state department of agriculture, who will take testimony for and against the revised butter marketing agreement being submitted by co-operative and private manufacturers of Oregon.

## CENTRALIA BANK HOLDUP FAILURE

CENTRALIA, Wash., March 22.—(AP)—Two men who attempted to hold up the Centralia branch of the National Bank of Commerce of Seattle escaped today after slugging Reva Burdette, an employee, and failing to gain entrance to the building.

The bandits were waiting in front of the bank when Miss Burdette, the first to arrive for work, walked into the entrance. They demanded she unlock the door, but the girl said she didn't have a key.

One of them then fired a shot at her at close range, but missed. The robber then hit her over the head, apparently with a revolver butt, and he and his companion fled in a car parked at the side of the bank.

Miss Burdette was taken to a hospital, where it was reported the head injury was not serious.

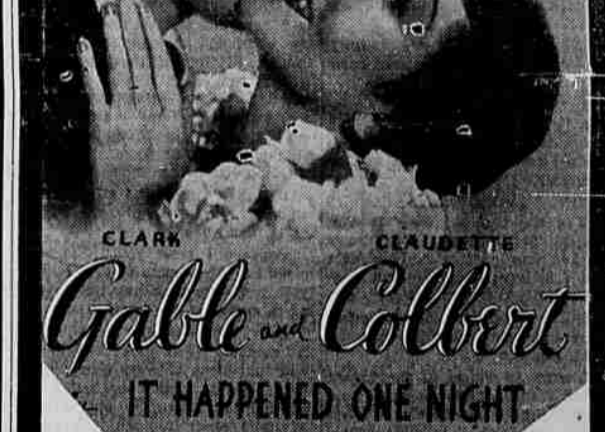
