

NANA FILM BAN STIRS SPOKANE

SPOKANE, Wash., March 23.—(UP)—Battle of censorship in Spokane was heightened today when attorneys for United Artists' Corporation filed a motion to restrain City Commissioner Colburn from preventing showing of the Anna Sen film, "Nana."

Colburn has ruled the picture "immoral," though admitting he had never seen it. He said he based his opinion on the newly-formed 10-person censorship board which first voted 6 to 5 and later 7 to 3 against the showing.

The motion filed today charged Colburn with being irregular and illegal in censoring the film. They further ask a permanent restrainer to prevent Colburn's threat to use police power to stop the picture.

NAVY MARRIAGE TOO DIFFICULT

Mrs. Joseph drank poison at a Seattle dock after prolonged unsuccessful efforts to reach her husband by telephone at Bremerton last night.

She declared she and her husband were in love with each other, but that his long absences and quarrels with their families made their union difficult.

She said she could not get along either with her family, Mr. and Mrs. Frank Hafner, Richmond, or her husband's parents.

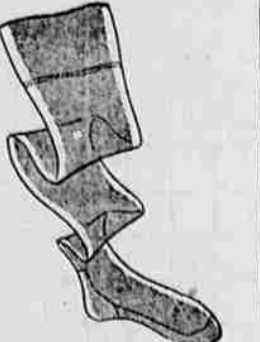

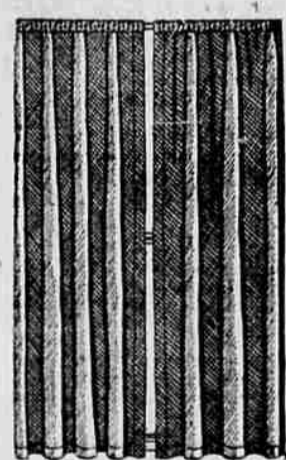
