

DUDE RANCH PLANNED IN WILDS OF ALASKA

SEWARD, Alaska, March 23.—(UP)—Alaska, last hardy outpost of frontier days, is going "dude ranch!" The announcement was made today that Alaska's first dude ranch will be established at Kaslof on Kenai peninsula in the heart of the

big game lands. James E. Simson, prominent Wyoming sportsman and operator of a similar resort at Jackson Hole, Wyo., will operate it. Sportsmen annually visit Kenai peninsula to hunt big game.

NON-SUIT GRANTED TRUCK DRIVERS IN MRS. TURPIN'S SUIT

An involuntary non-suit was granted by the court yesterday in the damage suit of Mrs. Anna Turpin against the Southern Pacific railroad, insofar as J. C. Cline and Jack McHenry, truck operators, and co-defendants were concerned. The motion of the railroad company for a non-suit was denied.

Arguments for the Cline-McHenry non-suit were made by Attorney Robert Hammond. Plaintiff's counsel raised no objections to it. The non-suit was based upon the California law, covering the powers of a guest passenger to sue the auto host for personal injury damage.

Medical testimony, photographs and maps and drawings of the scene of the crossing accident were introduced by the railroad company. The photographs showed open country near the Mt. Hebron, Calif., crossing, with a clear view of the track for two miles in either direction. The railroad cited a supreme court decision holding that a railroad train has the right of way over an auto and that the engineer of a train has the right to presume that an auto will get out of the way. The defense holds that the plaintiff was guilty of contributory negligence.

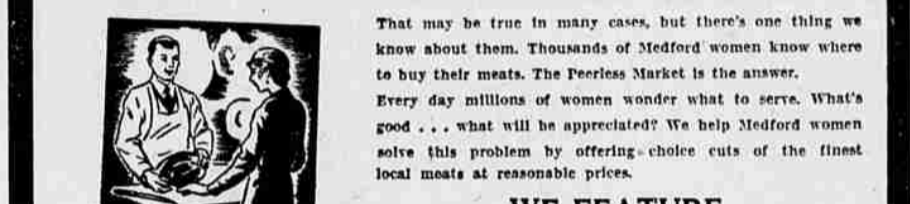
