GROWERS TO GET HINTS ON SPRAY

Pear and apple growers, desiring to reduce their losses from codling moth worms, should attend the spraying demonstration to be held at the Southern Oregon Experiment station near Talent, Friday morning at 10 a. m., states L. F. Wilcox, county agent.

The lack of sufficient amounts of spray per tree and the uneven distribution thereof are factors responsible for poor control of worms to a greater extent than most growers realize.

The demonstration will help growers to arrive at a method of application that will insure complete coverage. Growers interested should be present at the time specified.

Easter - First Celebrated in Jackson County's Oldest Church in 1854.

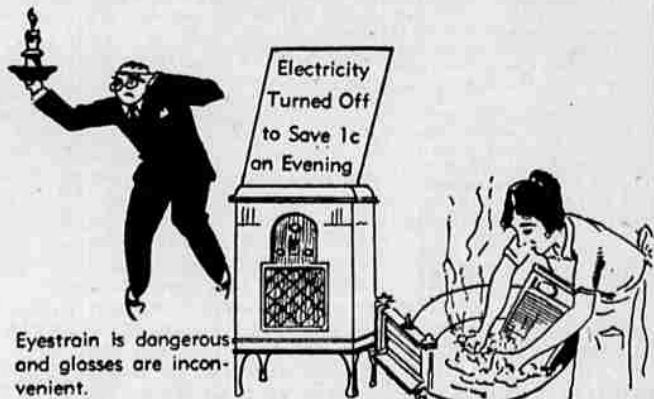
