

FEDERAL PAYROLL BOOSTED HERE BY PASSAGE OF LAW

Increased pay for federal employees, as provided in the bill passed Wednesday night when the senate overrode the president's veto, will bring a higher payroll into Medford, through several channels, operated by the federal government, survey discloses.

Included in the government positions here, and for which payrolls are made from Medford are the army officers and enlisted men who are on duty with the Civilian Conservation Corps, the Rogue River national forest employes, the Crater Lake National park employes, postal employes, internal revenue men, deputy United States marshal, federal engineer, and the weather bureau employes.

Superintendent E. C. Solinsky of national park, stated that the five per cent increase, retroactive to February 1, and continuing to June 30, would raise the payroll for the park \$473. With the pay increase rising to 10 per cent July 1, the coming fiscal year will show a total of approximately \$3500 added to the park payroll.

Officials at the forestry office stated that the payroll going out of that department, before the 15 per cent cut was made in the economy program, reached \$12,000 monthly, and in the summer time was approximately \$20,000. The return of a portion of the cut, is expected to bring the figures much closer to the original pay, especially after the first of July.

Postal employes' total payroll each month, is about \$2500, with 15 per cent deduction already taken out. This figure will also be raised when the per centages are added on again. Due to the system of paying the army men, with salaries affixed according to pay periods based on the number of years of service, as well as the deductions given other federal employes, it was impossible to estimate the amount of revenue coming here from this branch. Payrolls are made out at corps area headquarters, the Presidio at San Francisco, and no figures were available here.

191 CCC ENROLLES LEAVING TONIGHT FOR HOMES EAST

There will be 191 men from three Civilian Conservation Corps camps in the Medford district—South Fork of the Rogue, Rand Ranger station, and Camp Sebastian, also 122 men from the Eugene CCC district leave Medford this evening on a special train, en route to Fort Sheridan, Ill., where they will be discharged. The men making the trip are those who did not re-enroll for the coming period.

Captain S. Gordon Hyde, Inf.-Res., of the Eugene district, will act as train commander, while Second Lieutenant Edward K. Baer, Engr.-Res., of this district will be mess officer. First Lieutenant L. B. Hanson, Med-Hvy, also of the Eugene district, has been designated as train medical officer. Orders out of district headquarters also state Captain Jack Drew, FA-Res., will also accompany the train.

Eighty-nine enrollees from the South Fork of the Rogue camp will be leaving, 70 from Rand Ranger station camp, and 19 from the Cape Sebastian camp on the coast. Men were scheduled to arrive here between noon and 2 p. m. today from their camps.

Enrollees from the Eugene district will arrive in their cars on the Shasta this evening, and according to orders, the train is due out of Medford at 8:30 tonight.

Jacob Moss arrived here on the Oregonian today from Portland to take charge of fixing the dinner for the special train. The Eugene men will be in cars Hamelin, Alepho, Lyken and Strelitz, while the Medford district men will travel in cars Eidelon, Rudyard, Rochelle and Milbrook.

Itinerary announced here shows the train will arrive at Ogden, Utah, at 8 a. m., April 1, at Omaha, Neb., at 10:30 a. m., April 2, at Chicago at 3 a. m., April 3, and at Fort Sheridan, Ill., at 5 a. m., the same date.

CULINARY CRAFT

SHORTCAKES
One of the miracles of spring is the appearance of strawberries on the market almost before the snow is off the ground. Not the "frozen fresh" product, which is delicious indeed, but the honest-to-goodness fresh garden berries. And oh, how good they are! Especially in shortcakes.



Now there are shortcakes and shortcakes. It hardly seems believable that there is a housewife in our midst who doesn't know just how to make a real shortcake but now and then we find the strangest combinations called shortcake and we are almost perturbed at the injustice of such an imposition. For instance, no sweet cake served with strawberries should be called shortcake, any more than a strawberry sundae should be labeled "shortcake."

Here are shortcakes to please the taste of an epicure:

- Genuine Shortcake**
2 cups flour,
1 teaspoon salt,
4 teaspoons baking powder,
2 tablespoons sugar,
3 tablespoons shortening,
1/2 cup milk.
Sift dry ingredients together, cut in shortening with pastry blender then add milk slowly and mix gently until a soft dough forms. Roll just a little. Spread one-half in a well greased eight-inch layer cake pan and brush lightly with butter. Cover with the remaining dough and bake at 450 degrees for 15 minutes. To serve, spread with crushed and sweetened fruit between the layers. Cover with whipped cream or serve with coffee cream.

- Rhubarb Shortcake**
4 cups rhubarb, cut in one-inch pieces,
2 cups sugar,
Cook the rhubarb and sugar in top of double boiler or in similar waterless method and use for filling. Sprinkle with nutmeg.
- Pineapple Shortcake**
2 cups of crushed pineapple,
1/2 cup sugar,
Cook the pineapple and sugar together for 15 minutes then cool and use for filling.

- Orange Shortcake**
4 cups of orange pulp cut in small pieces,
1 1/2 cups sugar,
Cover with sugar and allow to

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stand at least one hour. Use as filling.

- Delmonico Shortcake**
2 cups crushed strawberries then sweeten to taste,
2 cups sliced bananas,
Combine the two fruits when ready to serve and use for filling.
- Hawaiian Shortcake**
2 cups crushed pineapple,
1 cup sliced bananas,
2 tablespoons lemon juice,
Combine and let stand at least one hour before using as filling.
- Pear Shortcake**
2 cups canned pears cut in cubes,
1/2 cup white cherries,
1/4 cup maraschino cherries,
Combine cubes of canned pears and halved cherries and sweeten to taste, add lemon juice if desired. Let stand one-half hour before using.

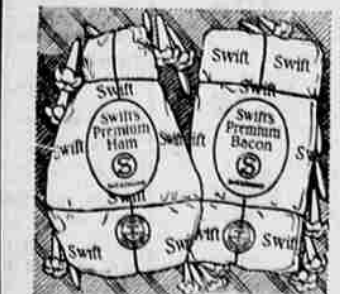
