MORE RADICALISM WISH OF PEOPLE DECLARES SOLON

WASHINGTON, April 3.—(AP)—Representative Foulkes (D-Mich.) today in a speech prepared for delivery in the house at the "brain trust revolution" charges of Dr. William A. Wirt of Gary, Indiana, asserting that what citizens want "is not less radicalism but more."

The Gary school superintendent was accused by Foulkes of aiding "Hitlerism." He contended Wirt would be disappointed if he expected the country to be shocked because of progressive tendencies in the Roosevelt administration.

Foulkes may have a chance to face Dr. Wirt in person before the week is out. Speaker Rainey expects to name a special committee to investigate the Indianan's charges tomorrow, and he probably will be called late in the week.

In a prepared speech on the floor today, Foulkes said:

"What the people want is, not less radicalism, but more. They are not frightened at the prospect of government interference with business. On the contrary, they are exasperated because the government did not interfere long before with the shameful robber that has impoverished our citizens."

ARMY AIR BASE IN MEDFORD HAS SOLON BACKING

WASHINGTON, April 3.—(AP)—From Oregon comes demands that an army air corps base be established at Medford because "there are no bases between Sacramento, Calif., and Seattle, except for a few planes at Vancouver, Wash."

Such a move has the backing of the entire Oregon delegation. Representative Mott (R-Ore.) says the Oregon coast is defenseless and he would like to see his state have at least one army base as well as have the Tongue Point naval base, at the mouth of the Columbia river, developed for submarines and destroyers.

The Tongue Point base has been at a standstill for approximately ten years since the city of Astoria donated a \$100,000 site for the development. Senator McNary (R.), Representative Mott and Representative Martin (D) have been working to obtain action on the matter and finally forced the navy department to order a commission of officers from the Bremerton navy yard to make a survey.

The members will not predict any action toward completing the project and say they only hope to see \$2,500,000 spent there as originally planned.

BILLION DOLLAR REFINANCING AIM

WASHINGTON, April 3.—(AP)—Treasury jotted down plans today for a billion dollars of April financing, and at the same time noted tangible evidences of business improvement.

Secretary Morgenthau said the method for retiring the billion in called fourth liberty bonds on April 15 would be announced tonight.

After a talk yesterday with the federal reserve system's open market committee, he added in the same connection:

"The committee seemed to be in a cheerful frame of mind over business conditions."

FAMILY BATTLE AIRED IN COURT

CHARGES of assault and battery were filed this morning against William E. Cook, by his daughter-in-law, Chelena Cook, wife of Lemmy Cook. The case was being heard in justice court this afternoon. Deputy District Attorney George W. Neilson representing the state.

According to Mrs. Cook's complaint, she and her father-in-law engaged in a scuffle this morning during which she alleges he dragged her from the house and threw her down. Both Cook families reside in the same house.

RUSSIAN RESCUE PLANE AT EGLIN

NOME, Alaska, April 3.—(AP)—A wireless message received here today from Siberia said that Pilot M. T. Sletneff landed safely at Cape Eglin, 75 miles north of East Cape, yesterday in a flight to rescue 80 Russians adrift more than six weeks on the Arctic ice-pack between Wrangel Island and the mainland. Sletneff took off from Teller, Alaska, yesterday.

Sletneff is flying the second mercy plane of the Russian expedition. Accompanying him is Assistant Mechanic Bill Lavery.

They left Nome Sunday but bad weather forced them back to Teller, north of Nome on the Arctic coast, after three hours of flying.

NEEDLE TRAVELS THRU BODY FOR 33 YEARS

GREENFIELD, Ind. — (UP) — A needle which Ivory Deffenbaugh accidentally sucked into his lungs 33 years ago was removed from his arm recently.

The point of the needle appeared when Dr. Charles M. Gibbs pressed a swelling in Deffenbaugh's arm.

Deffenbaugh, who said he was 10 when he swallowed the needle, had suffered pains in his heart, back and shoulder during the last few years.

WOMEN, CHILDREN SLAIN BY MEXICAN RAIDERS

MEXICO, D. F., April 3.—(AP)—Diapaches from Oaxaca reported today that 20 persons, including several women and children, were slain, several persons were kidnapped, and the entire village of Guadalupe Vista Hermosa was sacked and burned by raiders.

The attackers, it was said, came from the nearby village of Monte Leon and Chilapa, inflamed by an ancient boundary dispute.

Federal troops were dispatched after the raiders, who fled to the mountains, carrying kidnapped hostages.

FLAP JACK KING OF A. E. F. TO TALK HERE WEDNESDAY

Captain Fred Anderson, of the Salvation Army, who was dubbed Flap Jack King of the A. E. F. during the world war, will be in Medford tomorrow evening, April 4, to address the Epworth League at the First M. E. church here.

Captain Anderson is on a tour of the United States, recording motion pictures and the voices of Scandinavians whose parents still reside in Sweden, Norway, Denmark and Finland. Captain Anderson will sail from New York in May for the Scandinavian countries, to show the pictures.

PORTLAND, April 3.—(AP)—Allen Giffen, 29, racing car driver and garage employe, suffered critical injuries which caused his death when his automobile crashed through a guard-rail on a curve on Canyon road before dawn today and rolled 200 feet down an embankment. The automobile, which belonged to a customer of the garage, was demolished.
