

### LUMBER INDUSTRY REGISTERS SPURT IN CURRENT YEAR

WASHINGTON, April 6.—(AP)—An increase of 29 per cent in new lumber business for the first quarter of 1934 over the 1933 period was reported today by the National Lumber Manufacturers' association. The survey also showed production 28 per cent higher and shipments 23 per cent heavier than for the first quarter last year.

Orders received at the saw mills the last three months were 3 per cent above production and shipments 7 per cent below. The report showed orders above output for the quarter in all softwood areas except the west coast and California Redwood, the total softwood orders exceeding cutting by 4 per cent, while hardwood orders were 3 per cent below production.

During the week ending March 31, the report said shipments totaling 202,484,000 feet, from 1473 mills, were the highest of any week in 1934 while production of 193,482,000 feet and orders of 204,769,000 feet dropped slightly from the preceding week.

PORTLAND, April 6.—(AP)—New business totaling 47,465,000 feet, about 10 per cent above the 3-year weekly average for March, but one per cent under the total for the previous week, was reported by the Western Pine association today for the week ending March 31.

Shipments for the week were 45,408,000 feet and production 39,941,000 feet, an increase in production of 1,313,000 feet.

Current orders for the week were 46,710,000 feet, compared with 37,465,000 feet for the corresponding week a year ago.

A conscientious teacher and a fine co-operative spirit on the part of the school patrons has made Thompson Creek one of the finest schools of its size in the county. Miss Rudd has been hired to teach again next term.
