

HAPPY ANGLERS CATCHING LIMIT IN ALL WATERS

Trout fishing is fine in river, in creek and in Fish lake—is the report of Medford anglers today, which will probably increase the exodus from this city mountainward Saturday and Sunday.

Innumerable limit catches were made at Fish lake on the opening day, many anglers pulling out the legal 10 fish in less than two hours of fishing. W. F. Isaacs, caught 30

trout in the Rogue near his lodge yesterday, and his son Dick, landed 18 trout from the river after working hours.

John Cupp, Glen Fabrick and party had especially fine luck fishing a creek, name of which they refused to reveal today, having intentions of returning to the same territory. They brought in 60 fish, which weighed the total of 44 pounds.

Leland Brophy spent two hours at Fish lake and caught the limit in that time. He reported the fish "positively leaping into the boat" in their anxiety to be hooked.

Mr. and Mrs. W. A. Holloway also found fishing fine at the lake, and announced that anyone can catch them there. Each got the limit and saw but one fisherman, who failed to do the same.

Steelhead fishing was not so good, so far as could be learned today, but the eastern brook trout and sil-

ver sides, brought from Fish lake, made excellent suppers for a number of Medford people last night. Mike Herman, Clarence Eads, E. W. Brown and Ray Nunamaker motored to the lake yesterday and came out before 8 o'clock in the morning, each with the limit. They reported the roads rough but passable and in better condition than anticipated.

Dee Hendrickson also got the limit at Fish lake and Dr. E. J. Carpenter and Dr. C. E. Kunz were successful creek fishermen. They caught the limit of trout in Upper Butte creek in two and one-half hours.

ASTORIA WORKERS FACE PAY CRISIS

ASTORIA, Ore., April 6.—(AP)—City employees here today found themselves in the position of working for warrants that can hardly be disposed of at any price.

A grave financial crisis confronts Astoria as a result of a court decision restraining the city from buying salary warrants of its employees as investments for sinking funds.

City Attorney James L. Hope said the decision practically calls on city employees to work without pay, with many warrants outstanding in the several sinking funds, those newly issued would not be called for months.

"If the decision of the court is carried out," Hope said, "the functions of city officials, firemen, police, street cleaners and administrative officers will cease, unless they are willing to work for the warrants."

BOHNERT AWARDED \$36 IN LAW SUIT

Arnold Bohnert of the Central Point district was awarded \$36 by a circuit court jury yesterday in the civil suit of John C. Thorsen, Central Point district farmer, for approximately \$335 for loss of 1,200 bushels of barley by fire last August. The \$36 was a counter-claim filed by Bohnert.

Thorsen claimed that the fire that devoured his barley stack was due to the friction of a threshing machine belt, operated by Bohnert, against the side of the stack.

Bohnert contended that the fire was caused by somebody carelessly smoking a cigarette around the threshing operations, and his counsel denied that the belt ignited the grain.

Thorsen hired the Bohnert threshing outfit to thresh the barley. The fire occurred during the operations. The jury deliberated about an hour.
