

POSTOFFICE AIDE FIRED FOR TAKING AIR CHIEF'S LOAN

WASHINGTON, April 6.—(AP)—Testimony that he borrowed \$10,000 from Paul Henderson, vice-president of United Aircraft and Transport corporation, has resulted in suspension of Chase C. Gore as assistant superintendent of the postoffice department's railway mail service.

Harilee Branch, second assistant postmaster-general, said today Gore had been suspended pending completion of an investigation by postal inspectors.

Henderson told the senate airmail committee recently that in 1930 he had loaned \$10,000 to Gore, who then was deputy to W. Irving Glover, second assistant postmaster-general in charge of ocean and airmail contracts.

Himself a former postmaster-general, the United Aircraft official testified that Gore was a friend of long standing. Henderson said the loan was made when Gore became involved in the stock market, and added that since then he had torn up notes evidencing the indebtedness.

INSURANCE ESSAY WINNERS CHOSEN

important later. It came about largely because Johnson first asked to appear for the Wagner labor board bill and then did not show up. Later, Wagner invited Johnson and still he did not show up. Wagner's friends have suspected the reason is that Johnson has been talking about organizing separate boards or mediation for each industry under the code. The program might supersede the Wagner bill.

One committeeman for the nation is a national dairyman who has been fighting Wallace, Tugwell and Frank on the milk policy.

Despite announcements to the contrary, not a thing has been done about the Russian trade because the Johnson bill (restricting negotiations with debtors) has held things up.

The nearest silver plot of all was the sending of the Dies silver bill to the senate agriculture committee. It should have gone to the finance or banking committee, but they are strongly anti-silver. The silver boys sidetracked it so that Senator Wheeler could get his clauses on it. Wheeler is on agriculture but not on banking or finance.

SAFETY OF AIR TRAVEL SHOWN

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (UP)—An index to the increasing safety of air travel was contained in the annual report of Roy O. Farrell, manager of the Kansas City municipal airport.

The report showed that 42,850 passengers embarked or disembarked from planes at the airport in 1933 without any accidents.

With a total of 19,198 landings and 18,240 takeoffs, only two serious accidents and one fatality occurred, according to the report.

Total poundage of mail carried at the airport showed a decrease. The poundage totaled 879,785, a decrease of 78,039 pounds under 1932.

Total passenger business, including commercial transport and army operations, showed a gain of 5,820 for
