

SENATORS PICKED BY SPORT SCRIBES TO WIN PENNANT

Poll Shows 1933 Champs Favored Again by Vote of Experts—Yanks Second Choice and Red Sox Third

NEW YORK, April 9.—(AP)—Given a substantial vote of confidence despite their failure against the Giants in the 1933 world series, the Washington Senators are picked to repeat in this year's American league race, starting exactly one week from today in the national capital.

Tabulation of votes in the eighth annual Associated Press pennant roll, conducted among major league sports writers and editors, shows the champions to be the choice of 49 out of 97 experts. This is slightly better than 50 per cent for Joe Cronin and his well-balanced crew.

Yanks Second Choice. The conviction that the New York Yankees are the only club with a real chance to upset the senators echoes from the fact that they are the choice of 33 observers to win the pennant. This vote gives Joe McCarthy's club a solid hold on second place in the consensus.

The rest of the clubs are picked to finish in this order: Boston Red Sox, third; Detroit Tigers, fourth; Cleveland Indians, fifth; Chicago White Sox, sixth; Philadelphia Athletics, seventh; and St. Louis Browns, eighth.

Some of the experts may wish to hedge if Lefty Grove doesn't produce pitching results in keeping with his \$125,000 price tag but the Red Sox are the sensation of the poll, nevertheless, with majority support for their first division chances and no less than eight observers naming them to dash off with the pennant.

Although they have some scattered supporters, the somewhat dismantled Athletics and Rogers Hornsby's hustling Browns are consigned to the depths. This marks the first time in the eight-year history of the pennant poll that the A's have been picked to finish outside the first division.

The experts have been crossed up before, however, and the situation may prove disconcerting this season when the games begin to count. Last year the Yankees were overwhelming favorites to win the pennant.

BATTING PRODIGY OF SEALS WOULD TOP OLD RECORD

Joe Di Maggio Raps Out Pair of Homers and Single in Opening Game With Indians — Ducks Win One

(By the Associated Press.) Joe Di Maggio, youthful San Francisco Seals' outfielder who established a new Pacific Coast league record last year for hitting in consecutive games, was bidding today to beat his own record.

He hit in every game of the opening series and topped off his performance in the Seals' first game against Seattle yesterday by rapping out two home-runs and a single, driving in three runs.

The Seals won, 15 to 5, then took the second game, 5 to 2, to go into a first place tie with Los Angeles. Di Maggio came home with the tying run in the seventh and last inning of the second game after slugging out a two-base hit when the Seals were trailing, 5 to 3. San Francisco took the series, 5 to 2.

Behind the excellent pitching of Jack Wilson, the Portland Beavers won the opener from Los Angeles, 6 to 5, but were blanked as the Angels walked off with the nightcap, 7 to 0. Oakland nosed out Hollywood to win the series, 4 to 3, taking both ends of yesterday's doubleheader, each by the same score, 5 to 1.

Sacramento found Gaby Street's San Francisco Missions for a doubleheader to take the series, 4 to 3. In the morning game at Stockton, Tom Flynn pitched his teammates to a 5 to 3 victory. 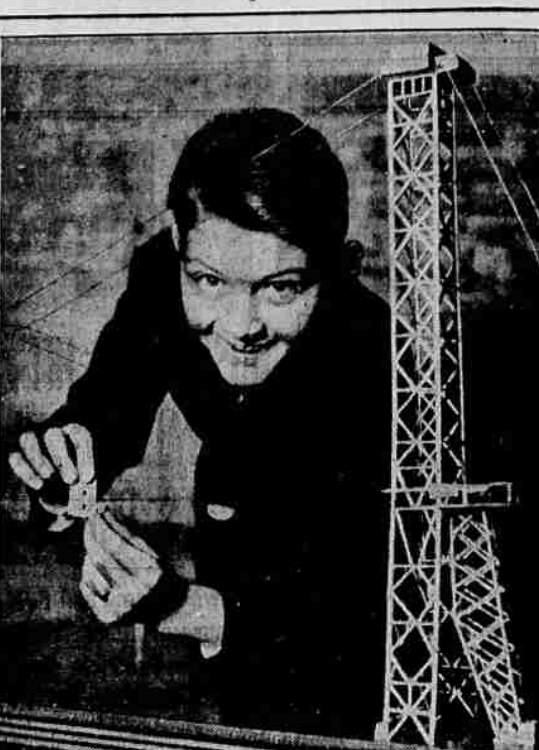
