## VOTERS MAY REGISTER IN OWN DISTRICTS FOR APPROACHING PRIMARY

Registration for the primary election May 18 closes next Tuesday, and all unregistered legal residents are urged to do so.

Legal qualifications for a voter are six months' residence in the state, and establishment of a residence in the precinct in which they reside. Qualified voters residing in the 11 newly created precincts do not have to re-register as their cards were shifted to the new precinct, and the voters notified by the county clerk's office.

Under Oregon law no voter can be sworn in on election day and must be a registered voter to receive a ballot.

SACRAMENTO, Calif., April 11.—(UP)—Tear gas bombs were hurled at surely Filipino picketers Tuesday as California's agricultural disorders centered in the Florin area strawberry fields.

A concentration of 80 Filipinos in 19 automobiles around one field in which strikebreakers were picking berries brought the first call for deputy sheriffs. When the Filipinos refused to leave, the officers tossed tear gas bombs.

Later the strikers gathered at another field and again the officers resorted to tear gas. Six deputy sheriffs were left in the fields to maintain order.
