

### ELECTIONS WILL CHANGE MAKEUP OF LEGISLATURE

#### 34 of 90 Faces Will Be Missing Even Before Primaries — House and Senate Leaders Both Out

SALEM, April 12.—(AP)—The makeup and organization of the 1935 state legislature will be changed materially as a result of elections this year, because even before the primaries and in the event all incumbents running for re-election are successful, 34 of the 90 faces will be missing.  
Neither the president of the senate—Fred E. Kiddle—nor speaker of the house—Earl Snell—will be back. Kiddle eliminated himself by retiring from politics at least temporarily, while Snell is a candidate for the Republican nomination for secretary of state.

27 Out of House.  
In the house alone 27 members of the 1933 legislature will not be back in their seats, and there is a possibility that some of the remaining 33 will be defeated for re-election. Four members of the house are seeking election to the state senate; two for secretary of state, one for governor and one for congress. In the senate, seven of the 16 whose terms expired will be missing. Two of these are seeking gubernatorial honors, while the two running for congress are holdovers, and vacancies would exist only in the event they are chosen to these positions.

Those from the house seeking senatorial seats include Otto K. Paulus of Marion county, E. A. McCormack of Lane county, James A. Best of Umatilla county and Dean H. Walker of Polk county. In addition to Snell, Carl Abrams of the house is seeking the office of secretary of state. Frank J. Loneran, ex-speaker of the house, is out for governor, while John J. Beckman is seeking the Democratic nomination for congress from the third district.

Two Speaker Aspirants.  
Charles Childs of Linn county, considered an aspirant for speakership of the house, did not file for re-election. This will leave the speakership fight, as now apparent, between Earl Hill of Lane county and George Winslow of Tillamook county. In the event of a possible deadlock it was reported Charles Huntington of Eugene may be the compromise candidate.

Representative Ralph Horan of Klamath Falls was shot to death and Representative E. F. Allen, chairman of the house ways and means committee last year, moved from Walla Walla and was ineligible. Frank J. Hilton of Portland is seeking the office of district attorney of Multnomah county.

Others who eliminated themselves by not filing include E. C. Judd of Astoria, E. J. McAlear of Hillsboro, Herbert Gordon of Portland, Dorr E. Keasey, who is a candidate for city commissioner of Portland, A. A. Price and Don Ryan of Oregon City, A. G. Clarke of Glendale, B. F. Nichols of Riddle, Levi Chriaman of The Dalles, James S. Oakes of Prineville, H. C. Herron of Junction City, J. K. Weatherford, Jr., of Albany, W. T. Miller of Grants Pass, Victor Eckley of La Grande, and John Lang of Baker.

Senators Seek Governorship.  
From the senate Sam H. Brown of Marion county and Joe E. Dunne of Multnomah county, both of whose terms will expire, are seeking the governorship. John D. Goss, Democratic candidate for congress from the first district and Jay Upton, Republican for congress from the second district are both holdovers.

Harry Corbett of Portland is scheduled to succeed Fred E. Kiddle as president of the senate. Senators whose terms expired and who did not file for re-election, in addition to Kiddle, are Joel C. Booth of Lebanon, J. N. McPadden of Corvallis, Arthur P. Ireland of Washington county and L. L. Mann of Pendleton.

### STUFFED SHIRTS INVENTED BRAIN TRUST IS CLAIM

#### Counsel to NRA Says Idea a Myth—'Brainless Government' Given Hard Slap in Talk to Bar Association

NEW YORK, April 12.—(AP)—The "brain trust" ascribed to the Roosevelt administration is characterized by Donald R. Richberg, counsel to the National Recovery Administration, as a myth born in the minds of the "league of stuffed shirts."

Speaking over the telephone from Miami, Fla. in a long distance address to the Trade and Commerce Bar association last night, the man who is himself a member of what is popularly called the "brain trust" took vigorous thrusts against "brainless government."

"When all the warped minds in the country rally round the know-nothing-do-nothing school of politicians and demand brainless government," he said, "it will be interesting to find out how many of the American people are afraid to trust their government to men who are accused of having brains and of desiring to devote them to public service."

NRA Discredit Aim.  
Richberg charged that unscrupulous elements—a class of business men, of bankers and politicians who have begun to conspire against a mythical brain trust—are engaged in a deliberate attempt to discredit the NRA.

"This campaign of the league of stuffed shirts," said Richberg, "is the greatest menace to our economic recovery today."

"It is high time for sober-minded people of differing political or economic views to join forces in discouraging the mere sensationalist and fanatic publicist from playing on the fast nerves and raw prejudices of our bewildered and long-suffering victims of economic ill health."

A release by the bar association interpreted Richberg's remarks as comment on the "Kerenyky" charges of Dr. William A. Wirt of Gary, Ind. Recruits Expected.

Richberg told the forum that the "league of stuffed shirts" probably will enroll "most of the discredited economists and financial writers and oracles of editorial wisdom who helped to inflate the bubble prosperity that burst in 1929."

Declaring that "economic revolution" is inescapable as a product of industrial revolution, Richberg said "the only present danger to our national sanity lies in the spread of that insanity which animates the league of stuffed shirts."

Richberg announced that he had composed this poem on his train ride to Miami.

"Outfielder squit,  
"Nobody hurt;  
"That is the end  
"Of Dr. Wirt."

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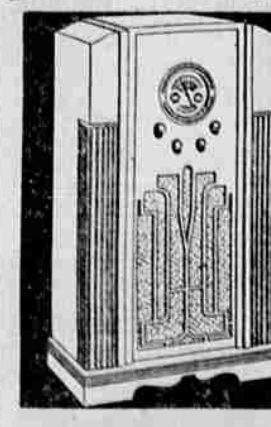

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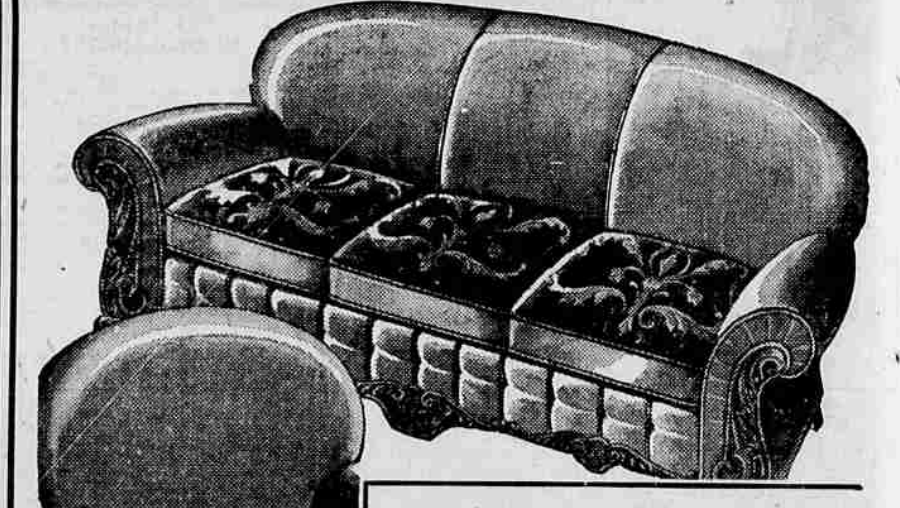

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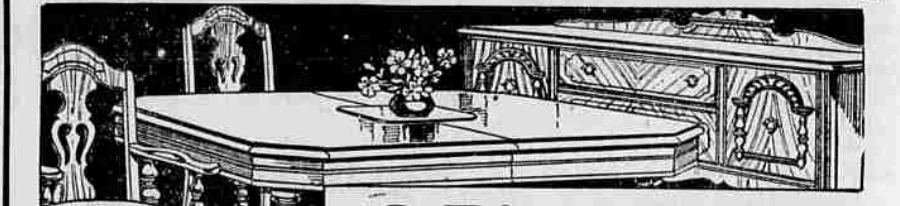
