It adopted an amendment to the revenue bill by Senator La Follette (R. Wis.), to this end after contentions were made such a policy would serve to minimize tax-dodging.

Two thousand workers at the Electric Autolite plant in Toledo, Ohio, dropped negotiations for a five per cent wage increase May 1, and walked out.

Two pickets at the Cleveland Worsted Mills company were shot, one suffering serious wounds. They told police an unidentified man fired at them with a shotgun. A strike has been on at the plant for several weeks.
