A very interesting meeting of the Travel Study club was held Monday afternoon at the home of Mrs. A. R. Clement on West Main street.

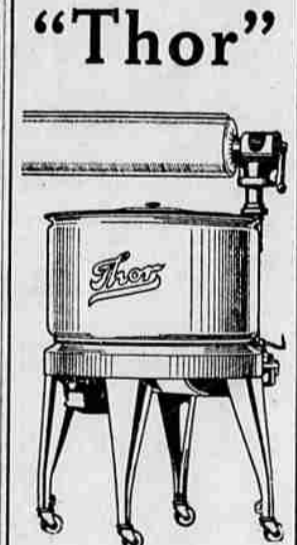
