CAMPUS LEADERS FEEL SHIFT WILL RECOUP LOSSES

Both Schools' Finances Hit By Recent Student Fees Ruling — Emergency Action Only For This Year

PORTLAND, Ore., April 14.—(AP)—A resolution asking that the Oregon State college football game be moved to Portland this fall was adopted here tonight by members of the University of Oregon Alumni Association and the Orange Council of Oregon State.

Financial conditions of both institutions were given as the reason for the invitation by members of both groups, who insist it was not an opening wedge to bring the state football classic to Portland every year.

Recently the attorney general of Oregon ruled that payment of student body fees could not be made compulsory under the present state constitution.

Both colleges enjoyed financial success this year, largely because of the receipts of the football game which drew a large crowd in Portland.

However, curtailment of spring sports is declared in prospect at both schools because of the optional plan.

It is understood that both schools curtailment of all student sports this spring and next fall due to the possibility of a new state constitution.

President of the alumni of the University of Oregon, said, "It is due to the recent ruling of the attorney general that student body fees could not be made compulsory under the present state constitution."

He felt that the money lost by the failure to make student fees compulsory would be more than made up by bringing the big game to Portland.

It is the possibility of a new state constitution that is the main reason for the move to Portland.

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BIG LEAGUES TO START RECOVERY SEASON TUESDAY

NEW YORK, April 14.—(AP)—Major league baseball resumes Monday on its recovery program, hopeful that public support as well as the performance of the athletes themselves, will justify the most sweeping changes made since chin-whiskers were in style.

To focus the national spotlight on the getway gestures, the champion Washington Senators of the American league will play the rejuvenated Boston Red Sox in Monday's solo opening at the capital. President Roosevelt will throw out the first ball and the occasion will be marked otherwise by ceremonies calculated to show off the great American at its best.

All 16 big league clubs, thoroughly overhauled and imbued with the optimism of springtime, will swing into action Tuesday. With a favorable break in weather, upwards of 200,000 fans it is hoped, will turn out for the opening festivities. The National league makes its bow in New York, Brooklyn, St. Louis and Cincinnati, the American league will hoist the flags in Philadelphia, Boston, Cleveland and Chicago.

Apart from the drastic player shake-ups designed to bring about more exciting pennant races in both major circuits, the signing of Sunday baseball in Pennsylvania for the first time and the adoption of a livelier ball by the National league, similar to the American's specifications, are prime factors in the game's New Deal.
