PARAGUAY CLAIMS VICTORY IN CHACO

ASUNCIÓN, Pajaraguay, April 17.—(AP)—The Paraguay, a ministry of defense announced today: "On Sunday our forces advanced 10 kilometers (6 miles) toward Fort Bolivian."

Port Bolivian is the main Bolivian stronghold in the southwest Chaco.

Death estimates mounted today with reports of a major engagement that may prove the turning point in the long Gran Chaco warfare between Bolivia and Paraguay.

Reports of the casualties conflicted. At La Paz, capital of Bolivia, army leaders said Chaco advances indicated Paraguayan losses at 1500 men. They added that a Paraguayan regiment had been surrounded with enormous losses.
