GOOD WHISKEY AT 55 CENTS PINT TO CURB BOOTLEGGING

Continuing the intensive campaign underway to eliminate from business the bootlegger, the state liquor store here will soon offer for sale "good whiskey at 55 cents a pint," it was announced today.
The shipment is expected in about two weeks, and will be made up of "reliable liquor" which drinkers can be assured carries no poison under the government stamp. While it will probably be not much more than six months of age, it promises to be good whiskey.

The state commission is doing everything possible, Earl Poy, manager of the local store, pointed out today, to reduce the price on liquors in order to run the bootlegger clear out of the field. It is impossible, however, to lower the price on certain old brands.
The Pacific coast now has practically all the old bonded liquor in existence. The supply has been exhausted in the east, and for this reason the state pays highly for it and must not sell the liquor at a loss.

Liquor is now being shipped from Canada in kegs for bottling in Oregon to bring down the cost. The state will not sell the liquor below cost because whenever the commission loses a cent, so does the taxpayer.
Indications that the public is settling down to more moderate drinking are found in the increased sale of wine, noted at the local store. The lighter drink is now selling at the same rate as whiskey, which has not been characteristic of the American thirst in the past.

A steady increase in sales has been experienced at the state store here each week and with the increase has come no change in the dignified atmosphere of the store.
No one under the influence of liquor can obtain liquor at the store and no trouble has resulted from enforcement of this ruling here, officials stated today. The public seems to understand that the liquor store is operated in the same manner as any other merchandise establishment and has made no effort to destroy the peace and quiet, which has prevailed there since opening at the location on South Bartlett.

The limited use of irrigation storage water for alfalfa crops, in the Talent and Medford districts, is scheduled to start soon, according to Manager Olen Arnsperger. A small force of men has been sent out to repair the canal between Fish lake and Four Mile lake, and the Hiatt Prairie canal. The water will be allocated to each grower.
Most of the orchards in the Medford district received a good soaking from the use of flood waters in Bear creek and the two Butte creeks, according to Arnsperger.
Crops - field and orchard - are now in good condition and showing good growth, according to the county agent's office.

Frost Observing Roy Rogers states that the pears are growing fine, some now being thumb size. The frost danger period is reduced by each day of near summer weather. There are no signs of a break in the present weather conditions.
Several farmers report the prevalence of alfalfa weevil in some of the fields, and a great deal of fireweed in some of the grain.

PORTLAND BUTTER PRICES ADVANCED

PORTLAND, April 19.-(AP)-The Portland Produce exchange advanced its quotation 1 to 1 1/2 cents a pound for butter cubes at the late season to the basis of 20 cents pound for cubes extra.
The butterfat buying price was advanced the same amount, to a general minimum of 19 cents for "A" grade, Portland.
While there continued much irregularity in the egg trade, quotations were generally being maintained here at the recent advance to 17c for extra with increase at 19c. There has been no change in buying values.

There appeared no change in the general chicken market tone for the day. Light hens were still selling around 12-12 1/2c with heavy as high as 15c, with Leghorn broilers 14c for 1 1/2 lbs. and more.
