

BIG TRUCK FIRMS GET PREFERENCE IN SERA IS CLAIM

PORTLAND, Ore., April 20.—(AP)—Accusations that favoritism is being shown contract truck owners, as against the small independent truck owners in the method of calling for bids for truck service on emergency relief administration projects, were made to the county commissioners here today by a committee representing independent owners.

W. C. Parker, chairman of the Oregon Truckmen's association, and others presented the complaint. They said the SERA headquarters is playing into the hands of the large truck owners to the detriment of the independents, of whom there are about 600 in the county.

Commissioner Shull said: "If it is true that favoritism is being shown the large truck owners, the SERA is not carrying out the intent of the federal relief program, which is supposed to give the small individual a chance."

One grievance the independents had was that specifications call for trucks without drivers, which would not react against the large operators, but would against the individual truck owner.

17-YEAR SEPARATION OF MOTHER, DAUGHTER ENDED BY KIND COPS

PORTLAND, Ore., April 20.—(AP)—After having been separated for 17 years, Mrs. George M. Rowland of Portland and her daughter, Katherine Swenson, 22, Los Angeles, will soon be reunited. The meeting has been made possible by the co-operation of Salt Lake City and Portland police.

Miss Swenson, knowing she had an aunt in Salt Lake City, recently wrote Police Captain E. E. Brown of that city, submitting a list of names which sounded most like her aunt's, as she remembered it. Brown finally found Mrs. William Stafford, the sister of the girl's mother. Mrs. Stafford said her sister was Mrs. Gladys Rowland of Portland.

With that information, Portland police had little difficulty in reaching Mrs. Rowland, although she had moved and had no telephone.

Mrs. Rowland was overjoyed at the news. "I've been trying for years to find my daughter," she told officers. "I'm so happy I could cry."

DAIRYING HEADS STATE INDUSTRY

SALEM, Ore., (UP)—Dairying is probably the most important industry in Oregon, the state department reported today.

Figures just completed show that in addition to whole milk for the market, Oregon cows produced in 1933: 26,946,594 pounds of butter, 15,164,276 pounds of cheese, 1,052,887 gallons of ice cream, 1,080,414 pounds of cottage cheese, 189,149 pounds of cream cheese, 2,379,721 pounds of powdered milk, 3,726,701 pounds of condensed milk, 577,668 pounds of sweetened milk, 3,204 pounds of sasin.

The blaze was discovered by his son, James Andersen, who lives close by, but it had gained such headway the son was unable to enter the house. In his attempt to rescue his father he was severely burned on the hands and about the face.

O. HENRY HOME MOVED TO PARK

AUSTIN, Texas.—(UP)—The home of O. Henry is being moved in a manner that would appeal to the fancy of Sidney Porter, could he return to Austin to witness its 300-foot voyage to a permanent haven.

Mules tow it like a barge. Huge heavy timbers balance it upon broad rollers. The mules leisurely slope one hip and rest as new stakes are driven to hold pulleys which they will propel further.

Built in the millwork era of American architecture, the house has a gable decoration like a flagstaff which heightens the resemblance to a vessel under way.

The short trip of the "O. Henry House," as Austin now proudly labels

it, will place it on a small city park. A brass plate on a chain grocery marks the Austin site of "The Rolling Stone," O. Henry's early magazine. A modern 2 1/2 beer parlor preserves the table where he sat and carved his initials in an old-time

Texas saloon, so the story goes. The bank where he worked has become a drug store. The jail where he waited transfer to the penitentiary has been torn down. The stenographer's notes of his trial have been lost.
