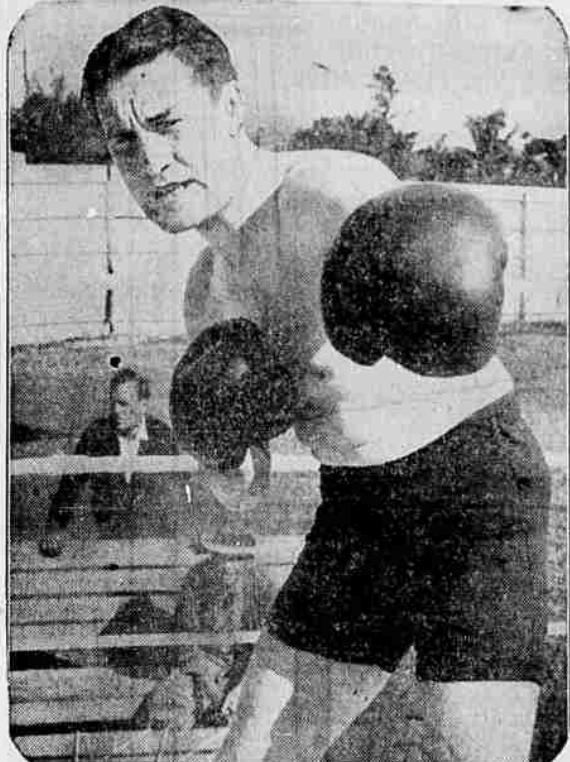


HEAVYWEIGHT TITLE CONTENDER

OHIO PROSECUTOR QUIZZES DILLINGER ATTORNEY



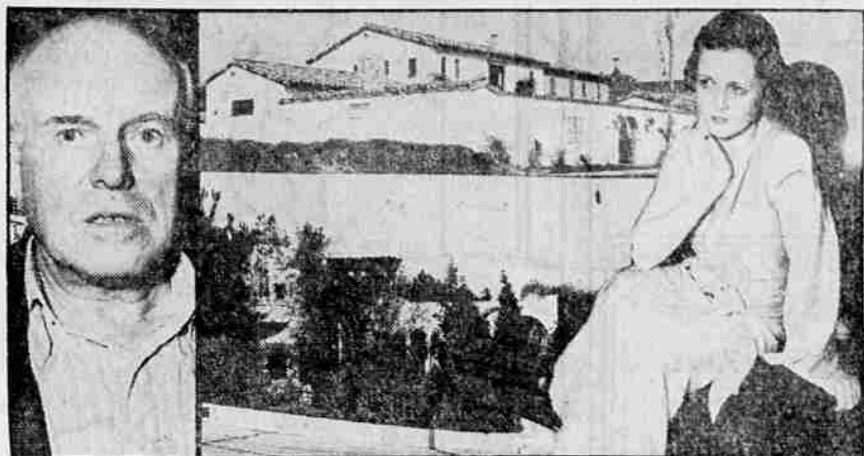

FROM GRIDIRON TO THE GRIDDLE



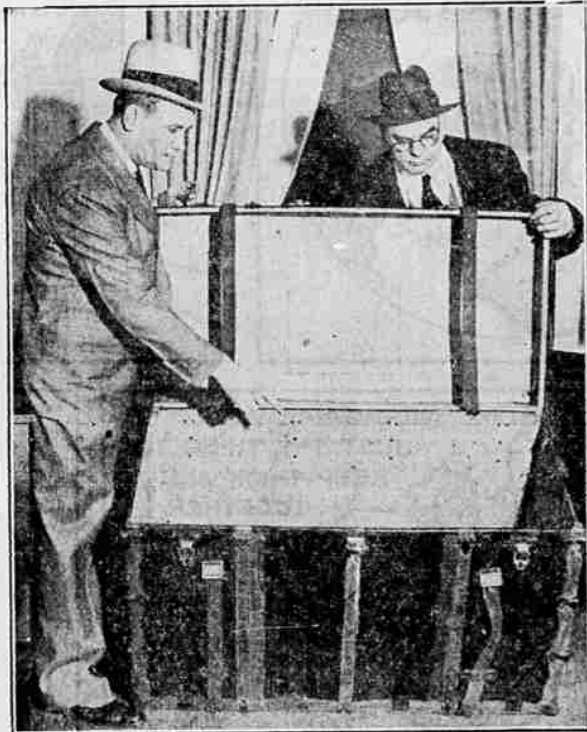

SOBS STORY OF GIVING AID TO SUING PARENTS



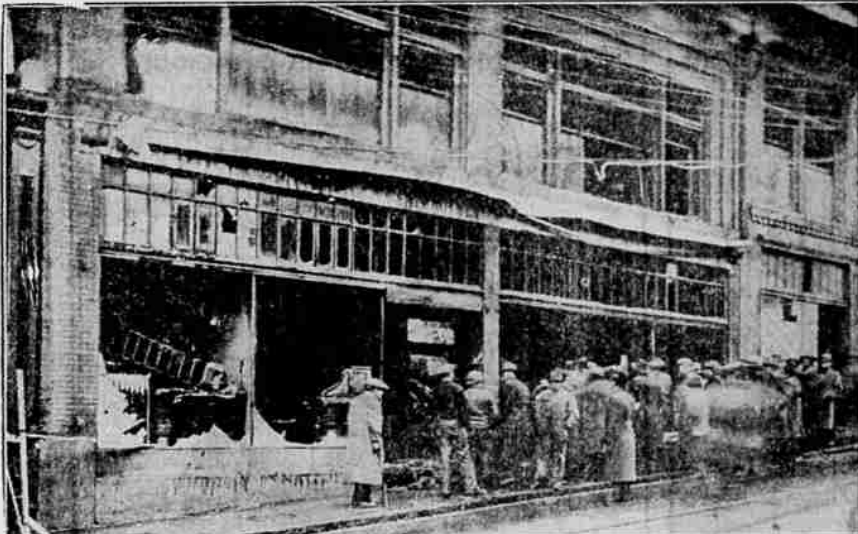
