

Stanford Star Sets New World's Shot Put Mark

MEDFORD JUNIORS TAKE TOP HONORS IN TRACK EVENTS

Ashland, Phoenix, Jacksonville And Gold Hill Schools Finish In Order Named—Many Close Finishes.

At the Southern Oregon junior high school track meet held yesterday afternoon at Van Scoyoc Field, Medford junior high school won 76 points, Ashland following in second place with 66 1/2. Third place went to Phoenix with 50, while Jacksonville had 35 and Gold Hill had five.

Darwin K. Burgher, Medford high school athlete, coached and manager of the meet, with Superintendent Thomason of the Gold Hill schools assisting, according to Ray Henderson, local junior high school coach.

In the 50-yard dash for the seventh grade, Robinson of Jacksonville was first, Weir of Phoenix, second, and Thompson of Gold Hill, third. For the eighth grade, Hill of Ashland was first, Verbiok of Medford second, and Hawkins of Medford third. Luman of Medford placed first for the ninth grade, Bailey of Ashland second, and Ettinger of Medford third.

Weir of Phoenix in the seventh grade was first in the 75-yard dash, Robinson of Jacksonville second, and Mitchell of Ashland third. The eighth graders also conducted a 75-yard dash, with Hill and Leabo of Ashland winning first and second places, and Verbiok of Medford third.

Ninth graders had a 100-yard dash, Luman of Medford placing first, Bailey of Ashland second, and Ettinger of Medford third.

For the high jump, Mitchell of Ashland, Thompson of Gold Hill and Johnson of Jacksonville took the first three places, respectively, among the seventh grade contestants. In the eighth grade, Forbes of Jacksonville, Marion O'Connor of Phoenix and Verbiok of Medford placed, and in the ninth grade, Stan and DeLoach of Medford took first and second, while Bailey of Ashland and Hill of Phoenix tied for third.

In the broad jump, Mitchell of Ashland was first in the seventh grade, with Gould of Phoenix and Johnson of Jacksonville second and third, respectively. For eighth grade, Marion O'Connor of Phoenix was first, Jones of Medford second, and Merle O'Connor of Phoenix third. Ninth graders placing were Ettinger and Doty of Medford, and Bailey of Ashland.

Seventh graders Weir and Turpin from Phoenix took first and second places in the pole vault, with Stone of Jacksonville placing third. For the eighth grade, Horner of Medford was first, Forbes of Jacksonville second, and Warren of Ashland third.

Medford's seventh graders won the relay race with a team composed of Piche, Peck, White and Smith. Coach second place went to Phoenix, represented by L. Jacobs, Turpin, Gould and H. Jacobs. Ashland took third rating, Mitchell, Harris, Doyhoff and Blackwell running.

In the relay held for the eighth grade, Ashland was first with a team in which Hill, Leabo, Gattling and Warren took part. Medford's second place team was Hawkins, Jones, Shaw and Verbiok, while Jacksonville, taking third rating, was represented by Mitchell, two Johnsons and Lusk.

Relay team for Medford, Luman, Ettinger, Doty and Tuttle, was first for the ninth grade contest, with Bailey, Able, Van Hardenberg and Hitt second for Ashland, and Barnes, Furry, Swisher and Hill for Phoenix.

In the half-mile free-for-all, Doty of Medford was first, Hill of Phoenix was second, and Ettinger of Medford third.

The medley race, each team composed of one person from the seventh, eighth and ninth grades, was won by Medford, represented by White, Verbiok and Luman. Mitchell Hill and Bailey came in second, while Phoenix was third with Hill, O'Connor and Gould.

LYMAN CATAPULTS IRON BALL 16 FEET BY MIGHTY HEAVE

California Bested In Annual Track Meet—Keisel, Bear Sprint Ace Wins Four Race Starts.

STANFORD STADIUM, PALO ALTO, CALIF., April 21.—(AP)—With one Herculean effort that sent the 15-pound iron ball out farther than it had ever been tossed in organized competition, John Lyman, Stanford's great weight star, marched into the hall of shouting fame today while ten thousand fans cheered him.

On his first heave of the day, the 200-pound blonde spun the shot 54 feet 1 inch, 13 bettered all existing marks, both world's and American, and put the big fellow in a class by himself, for the time being at least. A week ago, Lyman tied the American mark of 53 feet, 8 inches set a few weeks ago by Jack Torrance at the Louisiana state relays. The recognized world's record was made in 1932 by Franz Doude of Czechoslovakia, who turned in the amazing distance of 58 feet, 1 1/2 inches.

Lyman's record—bettering performance was the highlight of the forty-first annual Stanford-California meet, which Stanford won 81 to 80. Pre-meet dopsters had pencilled out final scores all week with the consensus giving Stanford an edge but not by such a margin as Coach Dink Templeton's athletes posted.

"Bullet" Bob Keisel of California completed his competition as an undergraduate by winning both sprints. He loped off with the hundred in 8.9 seconds and took the race easily in 21.3 seconds. Keisel was not pressed in either race.

Chuck Nimmo, Stanford's 120-pound distance runner, pulled an "iron man" stunt by winning the mile and placing second in the half mile. Nimmo lost in the ninth grade, Stan and DeLoach by one foot and he received a fine ovation for his great race after having taken the mile event only a short time before in 4:23.5.

The high school, fresh from three straight wins, couldn't halt the Jennings Tire hitting spree. Errors on the part of the high school were costly and figured largely in the defeat.

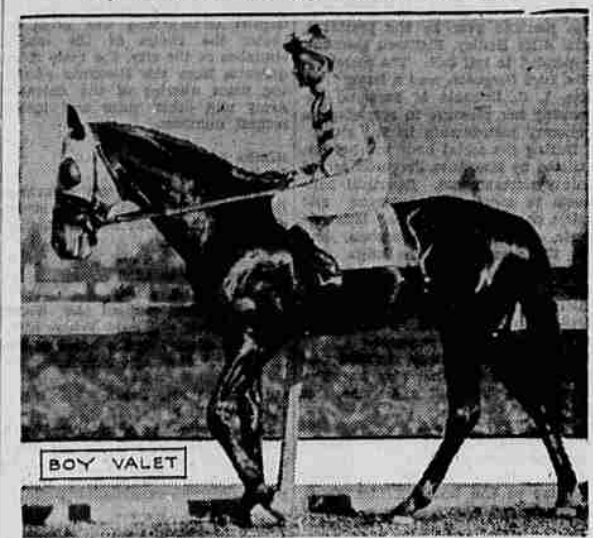
Lamport's escaped by the skin of their teeth in defeating Standard Oil. The game wasn't decided until the last inning.

Notice to Water Users!

Listed below are a few of the more vital regulations that the Medford Water Commission have set up to be followed by the water consumers.

(1) LAWN OR GARDEN—All extra area of either lawn or garden in excess of seventy-five hundred (7500) square feet adjoining or used in conjunction with any residence shall be charged at the rate of twelve and one-half (12 1/2) per one hundred (100) square feet or fraction thereof, which shall be payable June first of each year. This is a seasonal charge.

(2) OPEN HOSE NOT ALLOWED—The use of an open hose in watering is prohibited, nor shall any nozzle used in sprinkling be larger than 1/4 inch in diameter.

(3) WASTE NOT ALLOWED—Water shall not be furnished except through a meter to any premises where there are defective leaking pipes or fixtures. Water allowed to run to waste down sidewalks, streets or gutters as a result of the sprinkling of lawns, gardens or park strips is prohibited. When any such waste is discovered the water shall be shut off from the premises.

(4) TURN OFF IN CASE OF FIRE—All consumers of water shall close all faucets and fixtures immediately upon the sounding of a fire alarm. The water shall not be turned on again until the Fire Department has ceased to use the water supply to extinguish the fire. The Fire Department will indicate with the alarm when they have ceased to use the water.

The Water Commission asks the hearty co-operation of all water users regarding these few safeguards to our wonderful water system.
