## HOME ECONOMICS HEAD TO ATTEND WEDNESDAY MEET

Miss Clara Nye, state leader of home economics extension, Corvallis, will arrive in Medford this evening from Grants Pass, to attend the third annual Jackson County Homemakers' Day program, Wednesday, April 25, at the Christian church, Medford.

Miss Nye will be accompanied by Mrs. Amelia Sager, extension specialist in clothing; Miss Lucy Case, extension specialist in nutrition; and Miss Gertrude Skow, home demonstration agent at large, who will meet with the discussion groups on clothing, nutrition and recreation.

The program will start promptly at 9:30 a. m. with a band concert by the Medford high school band under the direction of F. Wilson Walt. At the noon luncheon, Mrs. Esther Merritt Sanderson of Central Point will be soloist; County Judge Earl B. Day, guest speaker, will discuss "The Importance of the Home to Society." The luncheon program will close with a style revue of dresses made in the economy dressmaking project.

The purpose of the program, according to Mabel C. Mack, county home demonstration agent, is to review the year's work in extension and to plan the program for June, 1934, to June, 1935.

Home extension units of the county and other cooperating organizations will be represented by at least five delegates and every homemaker of the county is invited to attend.
