**Polish-German Good Will Pact Stifles Discord**

**Mutual Steps Are Being Taken to Curb Discordant Factors Long Uppermost Between Two Nations**

**BERLIN**—(AP)—Making good neighbors out of the Polish and German peoples is the object of a "gentlemen's agreement" which has followed signing of the non-aggression pact by the Berlin and Warsaw governments.

Osclaw Przemyski, chief of the press bureau of the Polish foreign office, came here for a visit with naval officials and agreed with them upon measures to stifle the discordant factors which used to irritate the two nations.

**Acts Follow Words**

As a starter, plans for unveiling a statue in the Old district, inscribed "The Blazing Frontier" and designed to symbolize Germany's sorrow for lost territory, were abandoned.

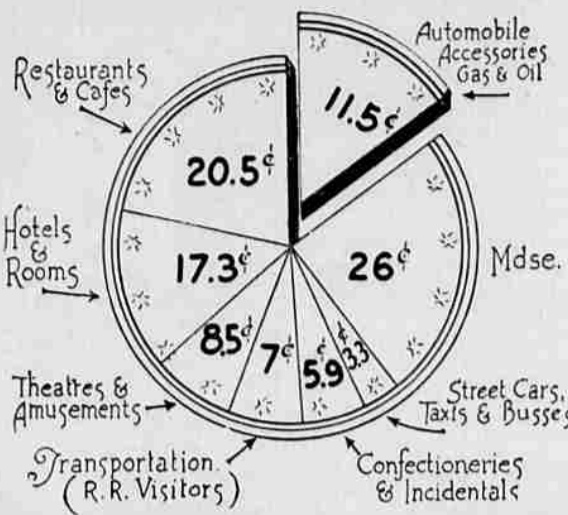
Poland responded by cancelling her ban on a number of German publications, some of which had been barred since 1928. She also seized a Polish satirical journal which had caricatured Hitler.

The National Zeitung, journal of Herman Goering, militant lieutenant of Hitler, sent a special correspondent to Poland. He is sending back amicable and gracious articles on the country and its people. One story upholds Poland's right to the Wilno territory, noted home of contention between Poland and Lithuania. Russia recognizes Lithuania's claims there.

Poland returned the compliment by accepting without question the excuses of a German aviator who had inadvertently landed across the border. In former times, such an incident would have raised a fuss.

A Pole at Bydgoszcz (formerly Bromberg) who attempted to snatch a swastika emblem from a German soldier's grave was seized by a Polish officer who told him in forcible language that the German had died for

## SPAIN ON VERGE CIVIL WAR, FEAR

MADRID, April 25.—(AP)—A state of alarm was declared throughout Spain tonight following upon the resignation of Premier Lerroux's cabinet, reports that President Alcala Zamora might be forced to quit, and declarations that civil war might follow the crisis.

Rafael Alonso, minister of the interior in the resigned government, announced the state of alarm—which is not so severe as martial law—as an electric tension, born of political and industrial protests, gripped the entire country.

## PORTLAND FIREMEN MUST MEET BILLS

PORTLAND, Ore., April 25.—(AP)—The Portland fire department is continuing its campaign to force its firemen to pay their bills.

W. H. Benedict was suspended from the force 30 days Tuesday, the eighth such suspension since the campaign was undertaken.

Five of those previously ousted are again at work after having arranged with a credit association for debt payment. Two refused to make such an arrangement and were permanently discharged. They have appealed to the civil service board.

## CHEMICAL BOMB TO FIGHT FOREST FIRES

SALEM, Ore.—(UP)—A Wisconsin inventor has notified the state forestry department he has produced a chemical explosive bomb with which to extinguish forest fires.

The bombs are dropped from airplanes as in warfare. The inventor claimed he could land bombs within a designated 25-foot circle from an altitude of 2000 feet. The bombs cost \$35 each.

ASTORIA, Ore., April 25.—(AP)—Pete Pardini, a choker setter at Camp 5, Crown-Willamette Logging company, was crushed to death by a rolling log today. It was the third logging accident death in Clatsop county this week.
