

HOMEMAKERS OF COUNTY SURVEY YEAR'S PROGRESS

142 From Nineteen Communities Attend Meeting - County Committee Members Elected for Year

One hundred forty-two homemakers representing 19 communities attended the third annual County Homemakers' Day, held at the Christian church in Medford, Wednesday, April 25.

Miss Skow Leads Singing Miss Gertrude Skow, home demonstration agent at large, led in a few staid songs.

Measures of progress of the past year's work in extension were explained by Mrs. Mabel C. Mack, county home demonstration agent, and illustrated by chart.

Mrs. Mack explained that there were 17 home extension units organized in the county that meet regularly each month with an average attendance of 20.

In the past year in foods and nutrition three projects were completed in the 17 units: home food preservation, including canning vegetables, fruit, meat, fish in glass, and tin and curing and drying.

In recreation and dramatics leader training work was given each month with 23 leaders enrolled and special schools in dramatics, dramatics contest and public speaking were given.
