Official ballots for Jackson county are now in the hands of the printer. Each precinct will have the number of ballots printed that it has registered voters. A separate name for precinct committeemen, will be printed on most of the ballots, as there was a sudden rush of precinct committeemen this year.

GILMORE GAINS BY CONTROL OF POWER

The efficiency of controlled power achieved by military scientists in the slow-burning gun powder used today, makes it possible to fire a projectile weighing 2400 pounds, which is considerably more than a ton, 25 miles out to sea.

Normally the charge of vaporized gasoline and air should burn slowly in the combustion chamber with a steady and complete expansion, directing the power when and where it is needed. Gilmore engineers have succeeded in perfecting a new "Fortified" Red Lion gasoline that performs in principle, in a motor like smokeless powder in a long-range gun.
