

CONCERT TICKETS PLACED ON SALE BY THE GLEEMEN

Tickets for the joint concert to be presented here May 14 by the Medford Gleemen and two visiting artists Frances Mullen, pianist, and Dorothy Warner, interpretive dancer, were placed on sale in Medford today. They are available at the following places: The Toggery, the Medford Chamber of Commerce, Pruitt's Melody Shop, Palmer's Music House, at the Baldwin Piano Shop.

The program to be sung in this spring concert by the Gleemen is composed of all new numbers and some interesting innovations, including a special arrangement of "Wagon Wheels" by Sebastian Apollo. Rehearsal was held last night and James Stevens, director, was enthusiastic today regarding the fine work done by the members of the chorus.

Something out of the ordinary is the universal comment of the press regarding the "unique program of music and dance" to be presented by the two visiting artists, who will be given half the concert period.

One critic writes of the two: "Miss Mullen's program at once stimulates interest—in addition to numbers by Bach, Chopin, Mozart and Debussy, it comprises seldom-heard numbers of Scriabin, Ravel and Bartok; "Six Little Piano Pieces" of Schoenberg, of which her playing has already aroused a considerable controversy, a "Hornpipe" of Lord Berners and a "Portuguese Peasant Dance" by Font de Anta.

"Dorothy Wagner, brilliant exponent of interpretive dancing, will illustrate in motion the Scriabin Preludes, two waltzes of Ravel, three preludes of Gershwin, the Peasant Dance of Font de Anta and other compositions. Discriminating music lovers are most enthusiastic over the programs presented by this artistic combination of diverse talent."

MRS. FEHL'S NAME TO BE ON BALLOT IS OFFICIAL WORD

For the past week a persistent rumor has been circulated in rural districts that the name of Electa A. Fehl, candidate for county judge, and wife of the imprisoned former county official does not appear on the primary ballot. Rumors to the contrary notwithstanding, the name of Electa A. Fehl does appear on the ballot, according to the county clerk's office and the printer printing the ballots, with the slogan, "Honor Demands Justice."

Who started the rumor, or what its "political significance" may be is unknown, but it has enjoyed a wide circulation.

Mrs. Fehl was the first of the three Republican candidates to file, the others being County Judge Earl B. Day, and Henry W. Conger of Jacksonville. Conger received the endorsement of the revived self-styled "Good Government Congress" at its first meeting. Mrs. Fehl early last month distributed circulars alleging her husband was the victim of a plot. Since then her campaign has been dormant and her candidacy has created no great furor.

The political pot in Jackson county so far has shown no signs of boiling. Chief interest centers in the sales tax, and a Republican choice for governor. Sentiment in O. O. P. circles is showing a desire to concentrate on a candidate who can beat Rufus Holman. Longman or Dunne have the lead with General MacAlexander next. Holman's chief strength here is among the grangers opposing the sales tax. Grangers favoring the sales tax, and opposed to state grange domination by Portland politicians, are leaning towards Sam H. Brown.

Holman was here a week ago looking after his political fences, and trying to confirm the fanciful information that the "Good Government Congress" could deliver 6000 votes to him. Holman two weeks ago denied the report he would pardon L. A.

NRA ASSESSMENT WARNING ISSUED

The following notice was sent out today by R. C. Burgess, secretary of the Jackson County Food and Grocery Distributors, the NRA code authority, to grocery, meat markets and vegetable merchants:

"Your NRA assessments are due and payable at the latest by May 10. The committee here has done everything possible to impress upon the merchants that this is a government assessment and there is no possible chance for anyone to escape paying the assessment, no matter who and where they are. Non-payment subjects the party to withdrawal of all code benefits, the loss of the Blue Eagle and legal prosecution by the national code authority.

"We would like to impress also that the code agencies coming out now for each industry are the property of the United States government at all times and subject to withdrawal on demand. You may pay or receive your blanks from Geo. R. Watters at the Safeway store, North Central avenue, or R. C. Burgess, 827 North Central, both in Medford, Ore. If these assessments are not paid by May 10 we as a committee are forced to turn in the list of those refusing to pay, for government action."
