Local Spirit Landed

The spirit of Jackson county and the Medford Chamber of Commerce received the unlimited praise of Portland's ex-mayor, who declared "Jackson county people think in terms of co-operation. When people turn out in the numbers represented here tonight there isn't anything you can't accomplish. When the Jackson county spirit spreads throughout Oregon, then we'll have a great state."

The work accomplished by W. S. Bolger, retiring president of the Chamber of Commerce, and by A. H. Banwell, manager, "known throughout the coast for his efforts," was praised by Mr. Baker with a plea to "give credit today where it is due. The flowers are beautiful, but we

can't enjoy them when we're gone," he concluded, congratulating Mr. Bolger upon his fine attitude toward members of his staff and other helpers.

After heaping compliment after compliment upon the heads of Jackson county citizens, Mr. Baker then began to question and "to scold," opening his remarks with "What do you know about Oregon products?"

Tomatoes Cited

The best know tomatoes in the world are grown and packed in Jackson county, he announced, referring to the Del Roque brand. They are finest in quality and in color and are grown here in quantities per acre exceeding the records of all other regions. With the proper support, he added, the Ashland plant will win a world-wide reputation.

"Knight's csetup is as good as any in the world," the speaker continued, asking that these small industries be encouraged to provide greater payrolls for Oregon boys and girls. He then asked that Oregonians remember the wool industry by having their clothes made from the Oregon product, again "unexcelled in quality." There are five mills in the state of Oregon manufacturing wool, he informed his audience, and most of it is bought elsewhere. There are 2000 little industries, just struggling to get along, which are producing things, equal in quality to the highly advertised produced. "If you're going to drink beer," he explained, "drink Pilsener; it's a Medford product; patronize the things close to home first."

Lauds Jubilee Plans

Turning to the Diamond Jubilee program, outlined earlier in the evening by E. C. Jerome, general chairman, Mr. Baker praised the committee for placing so much importance in the program upon pioneer motherhood, and asked for a return to the old spirit of kindness and neighborliness upon which Oregon, the home state, was founded.

Mr. Baker was introduced by K. W. Kendrick, toastmaster of the evening, who introduced Mrs. Baker, a former Medford girl, and other speakers and honor guests.

H. E. Harder, president of the new Jackson County Chamber of Commerce, gave a brief outline of work to be emphasized during the coming year, stating that the tourist as well as the firm and fruit crop would be encouraged. That new industries, wherever advisable, would be invited to Medford, that legitimate mining would be promoted and promotion schemes discouraged. He closed his talk with a plea that Medford people give their unified support to the job

of playing hosts to Oregon next month.

Bolger Thanks Aides

Retiring President Bolger devoted his time on the program to an expression of appreciation of the splendid co-operation given him by his staff and residents of the valley. Mr. Banwell, manager of the chamber; Miss Delphine Hinck, secretary, and assistants, Misses Justine Miller, Mildred Beeson and Anna Mae Fuson, were introduced as the "brains of the organization," and Major Clare Armstrong of the Civilian Conservation Corps was thanked for the splendid spirit of co-operation extended Medford by his organization.

Mr. Jerome, chairman of the Diamond Jubilee and the first speaker on the program, invited all guests at the banquet to return to Medford for June 3 to 9, outlining the inviting program in store for them.

Children in Tattau

He stressed the fact that the jubilee will be something greater, more serious, than a celebration, an observance of 75 years of statehood, made possible by the untiring spirit of the early settler, the pioneer mother. His talk was illustrated by an impressive tableau, presented by children of the Eva Benson dancing academy, who will pay tribute to the "Queen Mother" in a pageant at the jubilee. The children won a beautiful expression of appreciation from Mr. Baker, with which the tableau closed.

The Ashland chamber of commerce was represented at the banquet by Mr. Bernard G. Barkwill, president, and Gordon McCracken, secretary. C. H. Demaray of the Grants Pass chamber, who was unable to be present, sent a telegram, extending good wishes to Medford for the forum and the coming jubilee.

tration was 1655. For the coming primary it is 1769.

In Medford the Republicans show a loss of 295, and the Democrats gained 161 over the 1932 primary.

In Medford, in the 1932 primary there were 4200 Republicans registered and for this year 3905.

Total registration for the 1932 primary was 11,342 for all parties. This year it is 12,239. Registration for the 1932 general election was 10,139.

Between the 1932 primary and the 1932 general election there was a great desire to vote in Jackson county, and people came from far and near to do so. Solicitors were out seeking registrations at ten cents each. This accounts in a large measure for the increase. On the registration figures, Jackson county has a population of 54,000, figuring three persons to a voter, as the government does in computing census. It is generally agreed that the population is approximately 35,000. It is suspected and alleged, there was something wrong with the 1932 registration, and that many transients registered. After the next general election the re-checking of the registration cards is expected to show a decline in Jackson county voters of about 4000.
