

SOUTH AMERICAN DRINK 'MATTE' TO BE RETAILED HERE

CUBE BUTTER UP HALF CENT POUND

PORTLAND, May 3.—(AP)—An advance of 1/2 cent a pound was named for cube butter on the Produce Exchange for the late season, the only exception being in lowest score. On the open market a fully steady tone was suggested for butter, but the action of the exchange in advancing quotations during the big producing period, was causing much concern.
