

### POLLING PLACES FOR USE DURING PRIMARY SELECTED BY SHERIFF

Sheriff Walter J. Olmscheid has seen busy all week selecting polling places for the primary election May 18. Selections will be compiled early next week. Some changes will be made, but for the most part the former polling places have been retained. Eleven polling places will be picked for the new precincts created last winter, because they exceeded the 100 voters to a precinct limitation used by state law. Nine of the new precincts are in this city, as follows: South Riverside, Hillcrest, King, Cottage, Queen Anne, Medford South, Northeast, Kenwood and Haven. Brownsboro is a new precinct created from Eagle Point, and Ashland South is the new Ashland precinct. There are 69 precincts in the coun-

ty now. Formerly there were 58. The county clerk's office is making ready for the distribution of election equipment and supplies. Official ballots have been received from the secretary of state. Each precinct will receive as many ballots as it has registered voters. The ballots will not be distributed until the afternoon before the election and the morning of the election.

### MRS. ADELAIDE HENRY CELEBRATES PASSING OF 90TH MILESTONE

Mrs. Adelaide Henry celebrated her 90th birthday Saturday at the home of her daughter, Mrs. J. O. Coffin, of the Houston road. The birthday cake was made by her granddaughter, Mrs. E. J. White, of East Phoenix. Many friends called during the day and brought lovely bouquets.

Mrs. Henry, who was born April 28, 1844, has viewed many interesting events during her life. In 1874, with her husband, Nelson Henry, and their two children, they passed through Grand Forks, N. D., at the time of the Sioux Indian uprising. They later moved to Hinckley, Minn., where they operated the Henry house at the time of the great Hinckley fire in 1894, where over 700 people lost their lives and where a granite monument 57 feet high now marks the spot where over 500 unidentified dead were buried.

Mrs. Henry has 17 great grandchildren, 10 of them living here and seven in Superior, Wis. The White children of Crystal Springs branch, and Marjorie, John and Bruce Mills of Ashland are her great grandchildren.

Coming here from Duluth, Minn., 10 years ago, Mrs. Henry stated that she has always liked the state of her adoption.

### OAK TREE MARKS EARLY DAY GRAVE

Many leaves have fallen and many summer suns have come and gone since a lone prospector, weary with the labors of a day, came by a white oak tree not far from Ruch, along the Applegate highway. Fired with the heat of the Indian war of 1853, a redskin was perched among the branches.

A shot split the quiet autumn air and the prospector's mining days were over. His body was found a short time after by other miners and it was given a resting place in a shallow grave among the pines.

Joe Thomas, who has been digging back into history for Oregon's Diamond Jubilee celebration here next June, said yesterday the grave is still visible from the road, with a collection of small trees growing on the leveling mound. The miner's name was never known. No gravestone ever marked the grave of the unknown miner who sacrificed his life in the development of southern Oregon.

### SEED LOAN MAXIMUM INCREASED TO \$400 ON TREE FRUIT ONLY

Maximum amount of a federal emergency crop loan which is to be used for tree fruit production only, has been raised from \$250 to \$400 in the states of Washington and Oregon, according to a statement made recently by John A. Schoonover, president of the Production Credit Corporation of Spokane.

The time limit for the acceptance of these applications has been extended until May 18 for the eligible borrowers. By the increase in the emergency crop loan limit, it is intended to provide more adequate means of meeting the special relief needs caused by recent conditions affecting the fruit industry throughout these two states.

An emergency crop loan is made to an applicant who is unable to procure a loan of the same amount from other sources, who does not have a means of livelihood other than farming or other agricultural production, and who is otherwise eligible.

### FISTER PLEADS GUILTY TO CHARGE OF ROBBERY

Irral Leonard Fister, CCC worker, charged with assault with intent to

commit robbery, when arraigned in circuit court yesterday afternoon entered a plea of guilty. Fasting of sentence was deferred until an investigation of his past could be made. Fister's home is Plano, Illinois. The alleged crime was committed on Huchshot hill.
