

EPISCOPAL BISHOP HERE SUNDAY FOR CONFIRMATIONS

The Episcopal bishop of Oregon, the Rt. Rev. Walter T. Sumner, D. D., will make his annual visitation to St. Mark's church on Sunday and will administer the rite of confirmation to a large class of children, young people and adults. The class is the largest ever presented for confirmation in St. Mark's.

This is an especially happy occasion, for the bishop has been unable to visit Medford for nearly two years owing to ill health, and a large congregation of parishioners and friends is expected to welcome him and express their pleasure at his recovery.

The choir, under the leadership of Wilson Walt, has been preparing special music for the event. The anthem is to be "Seek Ye the Lord," by Dr. J. V. Roberts, and the soloist is Mrs. R. W. Bebb.

Service begins at 11 a. m. The bishop, accompanied by his wife, will arrive from Portland on the Saturday evening train and will remain in the valley until Wednesday morning. On Sunday evening he will administer the confirmation rites to a class at St. Luke's, Grants Pass, and Tuesday evening another class will be confirmed at Trinity church, Ashland.

VALLEY SCHOOL IN DANCE REVUE RHYTHM REVELS

Pupils of the Valley school this forenoon presented their revue, "Rhythm Revels," under the direction of Miss Dorothy McClean, in which they portrayed the year's accomplishments in the dance.

The introduction included some manifestations in rhythm-breathing in waltz time, heart beat, "Lub-dub," marching, Soldier's March and phrasing music, Boy Scout march, Delerose beat, Bluebird, a singing game.

Primitive rhythms were presented in the first part, and with the war dance, the children gave their interpretation of the origin of the dance. In this group they showed the calling of the warriors to battle, waiting warriors becoming impatient, the war dance, and the exhausted messenger entering.

Apathy continues among the voters, as far as candidates for county offices are concerned. This either indicates they have made up their minds or are satisfied to let well enough alone. Radical Democratic campaigners are the noisiest. They are predicting the nomination of weak Republican candidates for public office. This is an old political trick that operates on the theory that a Democratic nominee will have a better chance against a weak rival than a strong one.

The chief interest of the women voters lies in the school relief sales tax, as it affects their children's education.

General U. G. Alexander, "Rock of the Marine," and Republican aspirant for governor, was in the city this morning. The general will get a strong vote in the Willamette valley, where he is well-known, and also is popular among veteran organizations. Some sentiment for Joe M. Dunne

of Portland has sprung up in this city the past week. The Republican voters are looking for a candidate to beat Rufus C. Holman, who has lost prestige throughout the county, since his refusal to resign the treasurer's job while seeking the governorship.

LOWER INCOMES TO SUFFER LESS IN NEW TAX BILL

WASHINGTON, May 4.—(AP)—The married taxpayer with a net income up to and including \$25,000 will pay less than at present under the tax bill sent to the White House yesterday.

The following table shows what a married man with no dependents would pay under the new bill and the present law on earned net income, meaning income after deductions but before exemptions are taken:
