

NEED MEN, CARS FOR GOVERNMENT FIGHT ON CRIME

Attorney General Says 270
Investigators to Be Added
More Authority Is Also
Needed by Federal Agents

WASHINGTON, May 4.—(AP)—Attorney-General Cummings told reporters today the department of justice was planning to add to its crime fighting force about 270 investigators and to purchase a supply of automobiles, armored cars and machine guns.

Cummings said an additional appropriation is desired to better equip the department for the battle against the underworld.

The law chief did not say how much money was desired. He explained the division of investigation needed about 200 additional special agents and about 70 more accountants.

Motor Equipment Poor.
The motor equipment of the division was characterized as "pitiful."

"You can't catch a man who has a car that will go 70 miles an hour with one that will go only 45 miles an hour," he said.

He added there was a doubt concerning the right of special agents of the division to carry weapons, make arrests and serve warrants and subpoenas.

To clear up this situation, Cummings said he planned to send a bill to congress to vest right to perform these functions definitely with members of the division.

The move to fortify the department in these respects, he explained, was not due to the Dillinger case but it illustrated the need for more power.

Need Public Support.
"We need public support," Cummings added. "People who applaud Dillinger's picture on the films, as they did here in Washington the other day, make it difficult for law-enforcement agencies to carry out their work."

"The case shows how criminal activities mushroom upward to include lawyers, doctors and political bosses."

He said that state and local jail methods were "disgraceful."

"Some local jails and prisons are shams from which prisoners can escape," he added. "This situation does not exist in the federal prisons."

ALASKA BOOMED BY GOLD'S RISE

SEATTLE—(UP)—The rise in the price of newly-mined gold to \$35 an ounce, opening of canneries and fishing grounds, has started a new rush to Alaska.

The Alaska Steamship company announced they were bringing 13 vessels out of moorings and were overhauling them in expectation of one of the largest passenger and freight cargo years in history.

The steamship Yukon left port recently with every passenger accommodation filled, and loaded to capacity with cargo. Many passengers were women on their way to canneries and many more were men going to fishing grounds. The majority, however, were both young and old mining men, who hoped to "strike it rich."

TURKISH TAXPAYERS OFFERED DISCOUNTS

ISTANBUL—(UP)—Discount for cash is being offered Turkish taxpayers as an inducement to them to pay up on time.

Five per cent will be rebated to everyone who pays his 1934 taxes in full this year. Those in arrears for last year will receive from 25 to 50 per cent off if they come forward with the cash.

On the other hand, taxpayers persisting in falling in arrears, and those failing to pay up their 1934 taxes, will have them augmented by 10 per cent.

EXPERIMENTS IN GOVERNMENT IRK EX-CHIEF OF C-C

Silas Strawn Calls On Congress to Stop Enacting
'Hysterical Legislation'—
Definite Promises Need

WASHINGTON, May 4.—(AP)—The Chamber of Commerce of the United States heard today a call requesting President Roosevelt to "cease experimenting" and asking congress to stop enacting "hysterical legislation."

Silas Strawn, former chamber president and a leader of its conservative wing, asserted in an address that business men now wanted "more definite promises" in order to plan their future conduct.

Not Majority Ideas.
The Chicago lawyer ran directly counter in tenor to the generally approving remarks of Henry I. Harman, present chamber president, concerning the new deal.

Strawn attacked what he called the abandonment of a scheme of government which has made "us happier and more prosperous than any other nation."

He called for a three-way action by Mr. Roosevelt:

Balancing of all governmental budgets; a definite announcement that there will be no more requests for emergency legislation and "no more tinkering with the dollar"; and a revision of the securities act and proposed stock exchange legislation.

Johnson Is Heard.
Business men gathered at the 22nd annual convention listened to Strawn after hearing Hugh S. Johnson talk on criticism and the throwing of "pop bottles and dead cats" at last night's session.

The NRA chief said his organization had been shaped in part by criticism. Asked directly if the principles embodied in the recovery act were to be permanent, he replied:

"If there has been any good demonstrated by the recovery act, it will live and it ought to live; if there has been any bad it will die and it ought to die."

While not so outspoken, other speakers who followed Strawn today also found room for criticism, mostly centering around the securities act.

Securities Act Hit.
Malcolm Muir, former NRA official and president of the McGraw-Hill Publishing company, praised the President, but hit the securities act, and urged that prospective reform measures have no part in a recovery program.

Strawn said he had been unable to "get in step" with the present procession.

He said he preferred older ways than "adopting a daily portfolio of discordant experiments which seem impossible of being assembled into a new governmental machine."
