

'BAD BOY' REILLY PINS DOC BURKE IN ROUGH MATCH

"Bad Boy" Reilly of Boston proved that he is really a bad egg, by dropping Doc Burke twice to capture the main event on last night's wrestling card at the Armory.

Paul Murdoch, the stocky Oklahoma, and Bunney Martin, also an Oklahoma, stole the show by their clean wrestling as they worked on each other for 45 minutes—both receiving one fall.

The old ironclad rule of "the guy on top of a fella whose shoulders touch the mat" is the winner, claimed another victim last night when the Boston bad boy with his butcher boy arm floored Doc Burke in just one minute after they resumed their entanglements after the first fall had been taken by Dr. Burke with a bonzening and body press in 10 minutes of wrestling.

The third and last fall was taken by Reilly with a series of arm butts and body press. Two of the most popular boys who ever entered the Medford ring put on a real exhibition of wrestling last night. They slapped on hold after hold and not once did either of the men crawl for the ropes in order to get loose. Both men displayed the spinach trade-mark. In fact, the crowd liked the match so well that Murdoch and Martin were on the verge of having to come back for an encore. Perhaps it's because they're from Oklahoma. Oklahomans and Texans seem to be the favorites in this arena and there is an open season on Bostonians and Kansans.

Murdoch and Martin displayed equality on every basis except speed, where Martin had an edge; although Murdoch has strength that Martin lacks. Both men were unsuccessful in their attempt to apply the dangerous Boston crab hold. By the strength of their legs and back they would force their opponent to give up the attempt. Bunney's speed enabled him to avoid many a cruncher from Murdoch's arms.

In the curtain raiser, Rollin Warren defeated Carl Noland with a double arm stretcher. Warren was a little too much—a de-beef for the tricky Noland. The referee almost had to exchange blows with Carl before he could convince him that the match was over and the verdict had been in favor of the other man.

LOUISVILLE, Ky., May 4.—(AP)—

The beauty and the chivalry of the three-year-old thoroughbred world will race tomorrow for the honors that go with victory in the most famous stake on the American turf, the Kentucky Derby, but take it or leave it, you can put down this tip from the betting man and the blacksmith: At least one gentleman at the party will refuse to see the ladies home first.

Perhaps one or both of the popular equine beauties involved in this affair, Charles T. Fisher's Flamingo, Harry and Colonel Edmond Hiley Bradley's more sedate Bazaar, will disprove the supposition of masculine superiority but the odds are against them. If a lady is to enjoy the thrills of triumph, it is more likely to be Mrs. Isabel Dodge Sloane, New York and Florida sportswoman, whose crack colt, Cavalcade, rules the 2-to-1 favorite, with his stablemate, Time Clock. If something more convincing than the betting odds is required, there's the word of the blacksmith who will affix the twinkling hoots of the Brookmeade stable's pair. Up to now, he's the one fellow who has been silent.

"Colt or filly, there's no horse that can beat Cavalcade in this derby," he volunteers.

The sixteenth running of the derby bears all the earmarks of a comeback, except the added money has been cut from \$50,000 to \$30,000, the lowest since 1920. Reserved seats and boxes at the historic downs, as well as all hotel accommodations in Louisville, have been sold out for days.

CARDINALS RIDE HITTING WAVE IN PHILLY SERIES

The St. Louis Cardinals, riding the crest of a hitting wave that has supplanted their supposedly invincible pitching, now are justifying the predictions made for them before the National league season started.

After losing seven of their first nine games, the Cards began hitting and an 8-to-7 triumph over the Phillies yesterday made it five in a row and gave them a .500 average for the first time since the second day of the campaign.

Despite their comeback, the Cardinals still are out of the first division. The Boston Braves, the only team they had a chance to oust from the top four yesterday, came through with a smashing 6-0 victory over Chicago's Cubs and went into a tie with the undefeated Pittsburgh club a half game ahead of the Cards.

The New York Giants improved their position at the top of the standing by defeating the Pirates, 5 to 3. Brooklyn and Cincinnati battled through seven scoreless innings before the Dodgers go to play Ray Kulp for three runs, enough to win, 3-2, in the eighth.

Rain wiped out all four American league games.

ST. ANDREWS, Scotland, May 4.—(AP)—In a diplomatic way, Captain Francis Outimet has suggested to his Walker cup golfing team-mates that special technique is called for in approach shots at St. Andrews where the international matches with the British will be played next Friday and Saturday.

Two other low bids were rejected and three were held in abeyance to await more information on qualifications of the companies.

Exceeded Old Mileage.

Farley said the routes now outlined and those for which new bids will be obtained May 25 would bring the airmail mileage network to 28,548. When the old contracts were cancelled, 25,248 miles were being flown.

He estimated the cost of the enlarged network at \$2,000,000 a year, as compared with \$1,454,850 in the 1933 fiscal year, and the \$14,000,000 appropriated for the 1934 fiscal period.

The transcontinental routes went to reorganized carriers. Three cartinals of other departments have been studying for more than a week to determine how fully the old contract holders met the strict reorganization that followed cancellation of all previous contracts February 9 on charges of collusion.

The new concerns receiving new contracts were Long & Harman, Inc., Dallas, Tex.; Seaboard Airlines, Inc., San Bruno, Cal.; Wyoming Air Service, Inc., Casper, Wyo., and Central Airlines, Inc., Pittsburgh.

The bids to be opened May 25 will be on comparatively short routes designed for the most part to serve as important links and feeder lines.
