Burelsons Opening Downstairs Store



Burelson's store in the Medford building will take on an even more metropolitan appearance with the opening of the "Downstairs store" tomorrow morning. The main entrance is used for this department, a wide stairway leading to the basement floor where especially low prices will be offered Saturday.

Four fitting rooms with long mirrors and Monks cloth drapes are situated at the south side of the downstairs store. All wash dresses will be featured in the new division, and lower priced merchandise, including skirts, sweaters, blouses, hostery and lingerie will also be sold downstairs.

Burelson's entire millinery stock will be moved to the lower floor where there is plenty of space to display hundreds of hats. Mrs. J. H. Sugg, who was formerly associated with millinery stores in Ashland for 15 years, is in charge of Burelson's hat department.

An attractive decorative scheme has been carried out downstairs, the south side having rich black and gold brocade, curtains and dark fixtures to contrast with the ivory walls. A large rest room is another improvement in the downstairs store.

The present expansion of Burelson's store was made necessary because of rapidly increasing patronage, and the fact that the upstairs floor space was too limited for convenient shopping and displaying of apparel. E. T. Burelson said today.
