

### HOME EXTENSION LIFE MEMBERSHIP TO ALICE HANLEY

The Jackson county home extension committee met last Tuesday at the office of the home demonstration agent, in the courthouse, to confer with Miss Hazel Nye, state leader of home economics extension and Mabel C. Mack, county home demonstration agent on the program for the coming year.

Committee members present were: Chairman, Miss Alice Hanley, Medford; Mrs. Bertha Glasgow, vice-chairman, Talent; Mrs. Bertha Young, Eagle Point; Mrs. Effie Birdseye, Rogue River; Mrs. Lee Port, Appleton; Mrs. O. O. Maust, Phoenix; and new members, Mrs. Mabel Thornton, Rocky Ann and Mrs. Rita Myers, Eagle Point.

Miss Alice E. Hanley, retiring member was elected to life membership as honorary chairman of the county committee in appreciation for her sixteen years of continued service as member and chairman of the county committee. Other officers elected were: Mrs. Bertha Glasgow, chairman; Mrs. Effie Birdseye, vice-chairman; Mrs. Lee Port, secretary. Project leaders appointed were: Organization, Mrs. Glasgow; foods and nutrition, Mrs. Thornton; clothing and textiles, Mrs. Myers; child development, Mrs. Young; recreation and dramatics, Mrs. Maust. Recommendations for extension projects made at the County Homemakers day held April 25, were discussed and adopted for the county program. In organization, the major change will be the reorganization of the home extension units, on a bi-monthly schedule with the agent. Projects to be taught on alternate months by project leaders.

Another new feature of the program will be a farm women's camp in Jackson county to be held August 9-12, probably at Lake of the Woods.

In foods and nutrition, breadmaking, menu planning, table service projects were approved. In clothing and textiles, projects on making and use of the foundation pattern, and buy-manip will be given. In child development, radio study clubs will be continued and the project will start with a county-wide school for parents. In recreation and dramatics, recreation training meetings will be continued with special schools in recreation, music, dramatics and public speaking. The county dramatics contest will also be held again.

Following the adoption of the county program by the committee, the home demonstration agent is meeting with each unit in May for the purpose of planning the local program. These meetings were held last week at Eagle Point, Talent and Central Point. Applegate unit will meet May 7, at 1:30, at the Applegate school. Mrs. Lee Port, chairman. Valleyview will meet May 8, at 1:30, at the club house. Mrs. J. R. McCracken, chairman. Trail unit will meet May 10, at the home of Mrs. Eva Segosman, at 10:30 a. m.

### THIRTY DAYS FOR GASOLINE THEFT

Ern Bailey, 21, who was released from the state penitentiary about two months ago, and John Smith, 23, both orchard workers here, were sentenced to 30 days in the county jail and fined \$4.50 costs in justice court following their entering guilty pleas to stealing gasoline.

The two youths were arrested by city officers in the Siskiyou Heights Friday and were taken into court on charges of petty larceny.

Bailey was sentenced to the state penitentiary in October, 1932, for a period not to exceed four years, for stealing two revolvers, a rifle and a camera from the automobile of State Police Sergeant James O'Brien of Medford.

District Attorney George Coddling said that authorities at Salem who had granted Bailey a parole would be notified that he is now in jail.

### LIME COMPANY OF WILLIAMS CREEK ENTERS JUBILEE

The lime deposits on Williams Creek were opened up by his company last July and an Oregon corporation formed. A crushing plant was constructed for the manufacture of poultry grit and agricultural lime stone. The plant is the largest, engaged in the manufacture of these particular products, in the nation.

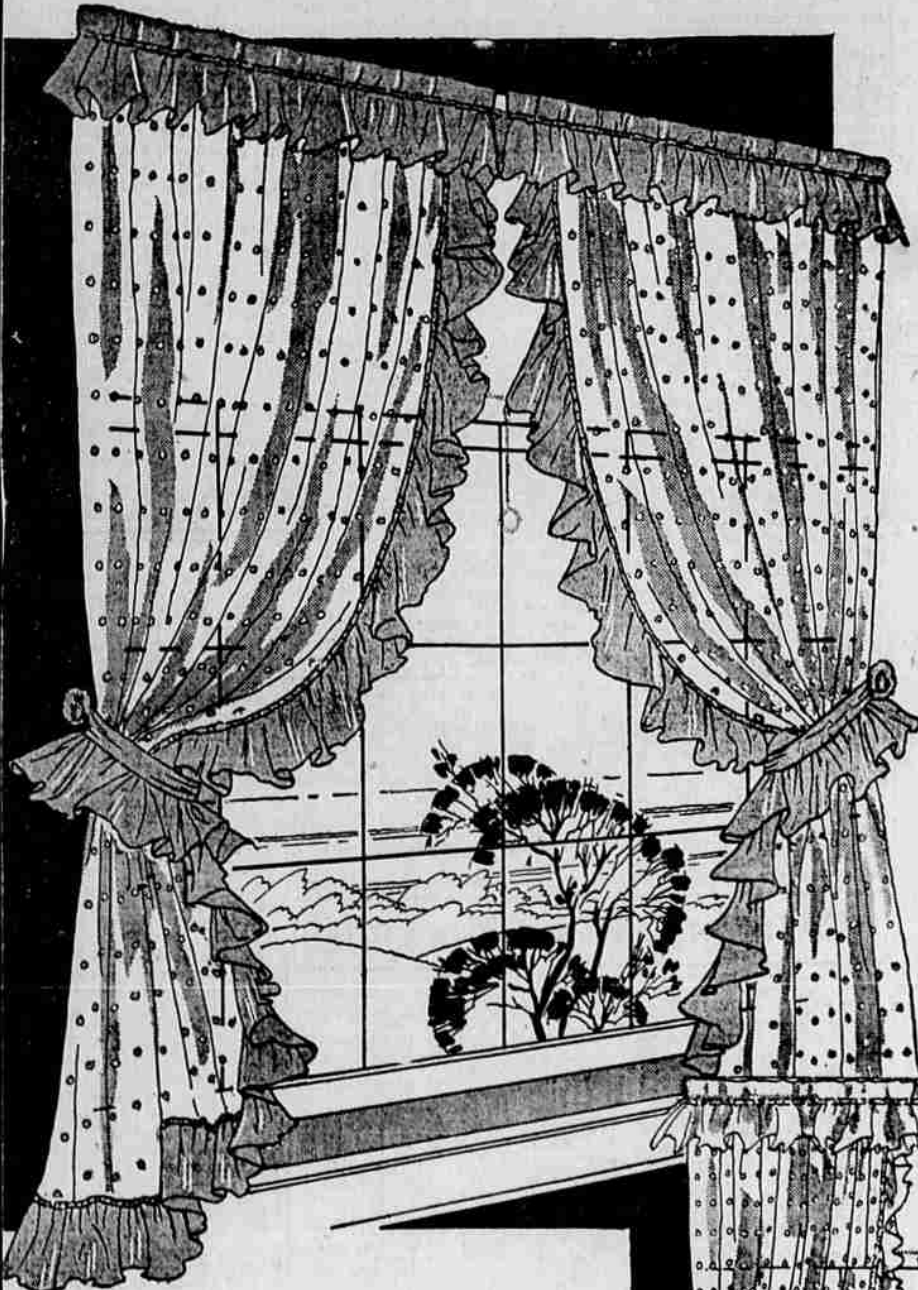
A lime kiln is to be in operation at the plant within the next 60 days for the manufacture of commercial and chemical lime. Between seven and 15 persons are given steady employment at the plant and the regular crew this coming season will be composed of 18 men.

F. J. Bristol is president of the company, Pinniger the vice-president, and his brother, J. W. Pinniger, the secretary-treasurer.

A display of the products from the plant will be featured at the Chamber of Commerce here June 16.
