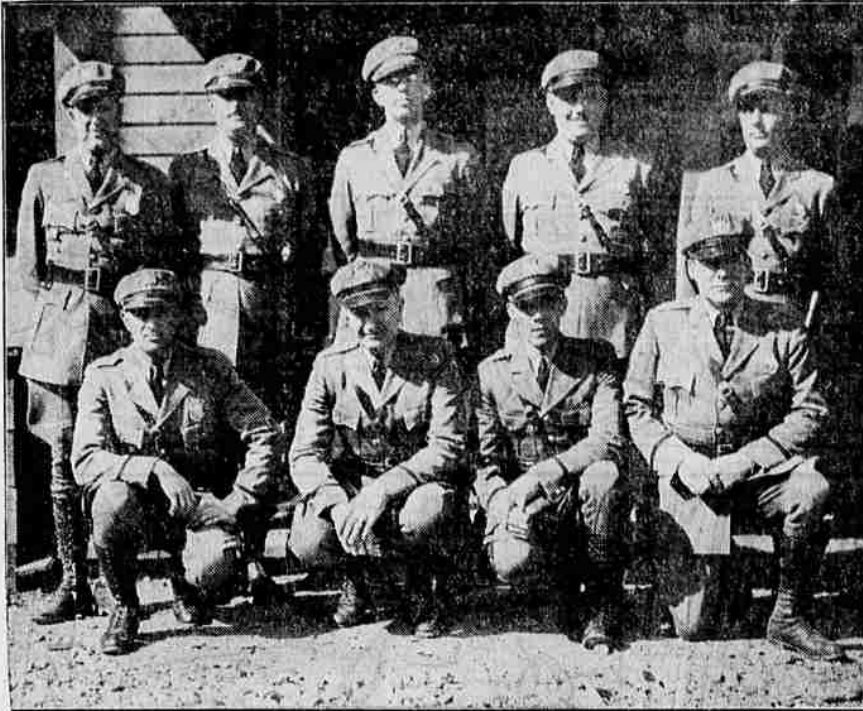


COURT APPROVES BABY STARS' FILM CONTRACTS

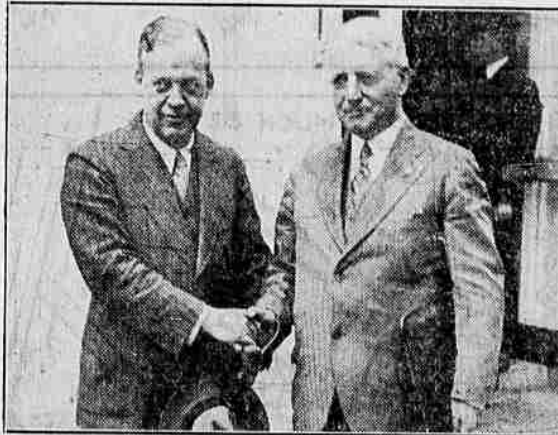

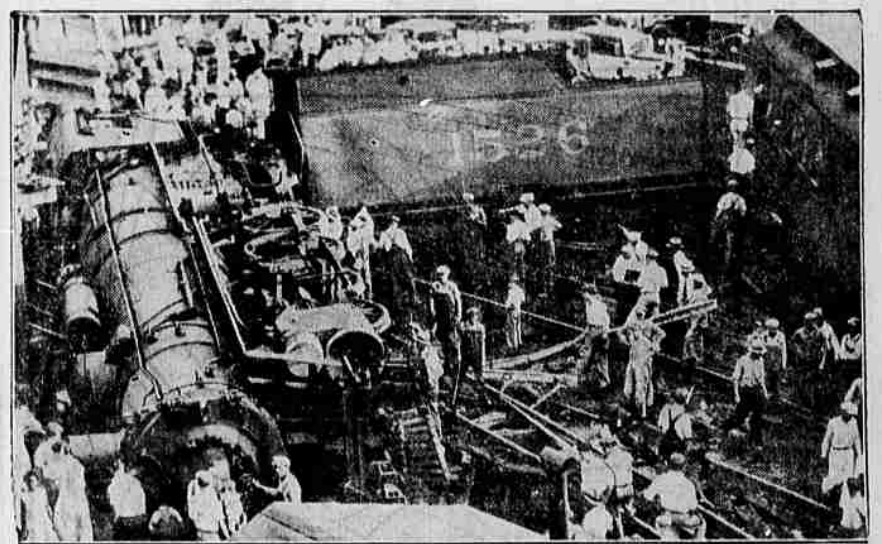

POLICEMEN HURT AS JOBLESS RIOT IN MINNEAPOLIS



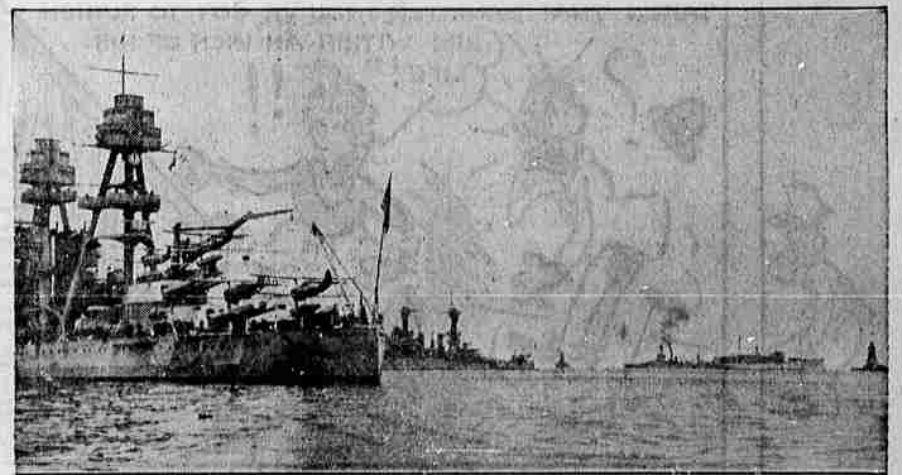
