Miss Beck Pleases In Evening of Song

The "Evening of Song," presented by LaMulle Beck, to a capacity audience on Thursday evening, at Baldwin Recital Hall was a delightful deviation from the ordinary recital. Of particular interest was the rendition of several groups in costumes, gay and elaborate. From the opening number, Miss Beck won the confidence of her audience with her poised and splendid stage presence.

Gifted with a lovely, clear, high soprano voice and a vibrant personality, each number was so beautifully interpreted, it made her singing an expression of joy. Her method of using the voice was free, easy and natural; her phrasing original and the quality did not change with a change in pitch, even to the finest pianissimo.

Most unanimous was the criticism of the audience on her excellent enunciation, even to the actual whisper in "The Green-Eyed Dragon." In gay attractive gypsy costume the singer made an effective entrance using her rhythmic dancing to accompany the rhythm of the gypsy airs. Her Chinese costumes were truly authentic and the Oriental numbers beautifully interpreted.

Perhaps the most favored was the group in Colonial costume—a "multi-ruffled" pink dress, bouffant style, with a white wig and old-fashioned "nose-gay."

"A Lesson With the Fan"—a musical recitation, revealed marked dramatic ability.

Helena Etta Drummond, accomplished violinist, assisted with four beautiful numbers, interpreted with a depth of feeling which won her much applause.

Roberta Ward Bebb, instructor of Miss Beck and accompanist for the evening, played with a technique facile and displayed tenderness of soul as well.

The floral decorations of the hall carried out the pastel shades of the evening, dresses and corsages worn by the three performers, and Lois Herman and Betty Fowler, the ushers.
