

# Calvacade Winner of Kentucky Derby by Three Lengths

### FAVORITE LEADS FLEET FIELD TO CLASSIC FINISH

### English Bred Cold Thrills Record Crowd—Discovery A Poor Second, And Agrarian Third.

CHURCHILL DOWNS, Louisville, Ky., May 5.—(AP)—Cavalcade, the mighty record breaking colt bred in old England but foaled in America, broke the hearts of two renowned queens of the turf today and raced to sensational victory in the sixteenth Kentucky derby.

Heavily backed to win at the short odds of 3 to 2, Cavalcade justified the confidence in his speed and thrilled a tremendous crowd of 55,000 spectators, the biggest in six years, with a glittering stretch drive that easily beat off his gallant eastern rival, Discovery, and left the two fleet fillies, Mata Hari and Bazaar, struggling in the rear.

Owned by Mrs. Isabella Dodge Sloane, New York, and Florida sports woman, who was on hand to see her colors triumph after being out of the hospital only a short time, Cavalcade's victory was worth \$28,175 net to his owner and gave eastern turf followers their first amazing thrill since Twenty Grand came home in front three years ago in record.

Cavalcade broke slowly and was carefully ridden by the veteran Mack Garner, astride his first derby winner in eleven attempts. Once he took command in the stretch, however, the beautiful brown colt, son of Lancegaye-Hastily, left no doubt about the result. Paying tribute to a long line of great British thoroughbreds, including many winners of the English Clevelde, Cavalcade flashed a finishing burst of speed that left Alfred Gwynne Vanderbilt's Discovery three full lengths back.

Closing fast, another colt, Agrarian, owned by Mrs. F. J. Heller, of New York, came up to take third place by a half length from the fast tiring Mata Hari, the highly regarded filly of Charles T. Fisher of Detroit.

Fractions at the barrier Mata Hari was chiefly responsible for a delay of eight minutes before the derby field of 13 was sent away to the mighty roar of the overflow crowd and this no doubt contributed to the filly's inability to hold the pace by the time the horses reached the back stretch. She succeeded, however, racing the fast-stepping Sgt. Byrne into submission and making it that much easier for Cavalcade to assert the supremacy of the colt in the most colorful classic of the American turf.

Never a contender and trailing finally in eighth place, the filly Bazaar shattered the hopes of the veteran Colonel E. R. Bradley for a third straight derby triumph.

Cavalcade clocked in 2:04 for the mile and a quarter, failed to meet the derby record of 2:01 4-5 set by Twenty Grand but received the shortest priced winner since the latter ran to victory for Mrs. Payne Whitney in 1931.

The derby carried a gross value of only \$37,000, the lowest since 1921. Besides the winner's portion, the beautiful gold trophy and the wreath of roses which went to Cavalcade, \$5,000 was collected by Discovery's owner, \$2,500 on behalf of Agrarian and \$1,000 for Mata Hari's fourth place share.

Opposed by one of the finest derby fields in years, Cavalcade made a big stride in the direction of the three-year old championship of 1934 by his exhibition of class and continued to demonstrate great improvement over his form as a juvenile.

### STATERS SWAMPED BY HUSKY SQUAD ON INDOOR TRACK

WASHINGTON PAVILION, Seattle, May 5.—(AP)—Unaccustomed to the sharp curves and the trick distances on the indoor track where they were forced to perform because of a driving rain, the Oregon State college Beavers went down to an overwhelming defeat before the Washington Huskies in opening the northern division Pacific coast conference track season today. Washington conquered 92 to 38.

Although the Huskies had not worked on the pavilion track since they were beaten by the California Beavers more than a month ago, they knew how to negotiate the hairpin curves and where to start their sprints, and they won all of the races and four of the six field events.

Bears Triumph MEMORIAL COLISEUM, Los Angeles, May 5.—(AP)—Southern California turned its annual dual meet with Stanford into a rout today as the I. C. A. A. champions walked home with an 82-2-3 to 48-1-3 point victory.

Fifteen thousand persons witnessed the amazing triumph which saw John Lyman, blonde giant of the vanquished, hurl the 16-pound shot 54 feet 8-8 inches to eclipse the accredited world record of 52 feet, 7 3/4 inches set by Z. Heljasz of Poland, in 1932.

The mark however, was more than a foot short of that set up by Jack Torrance, Louisiana State, at the Drake relays last Friday, when he threw the ball 55 feet, 1 1/2 inches.

CORVALLIS, Ore., May 5.—(AP)—For the first time since 1925 the University of Oregon Frosh defeated the Oregon State Rooks in their annual dual track meet by a three to two score here today.

The Frosh team of Swanson, Struggs, Palm and Miller, captured both the sprint events. Both the distance relays were won by the Rooks. Oregon's medley relay team bested the Rooks.

No records were imperted in the 11th running of the event.

### BEAVERS EMERGE FROM BASEMENT

PORTLAND, Ore., May 5.—(AP)—Behind the steady pitching of big Ed Bryan the Portland baseball team moved from the Coast league cellar by defeating Seattle, 7 to 3, here today.

It was the third straight win over Seattle for the Beavers, who again outthit the Indians. The defeat showed Seattle into last place.

Portland jumped on Crawford for two runs in the second inning and added two more in the fifth to gain their margin of victory. Seattle's runs came one at a time in the third, sixth and ninth innings.

The return from the Philadelphia Nationals of Prince Henry Oana added a hitting punch to the Beaver attack. Portland sailed the game away in the fifth inning when Oana homered into the center field stands with one on. He also scored after singling in the third inning.

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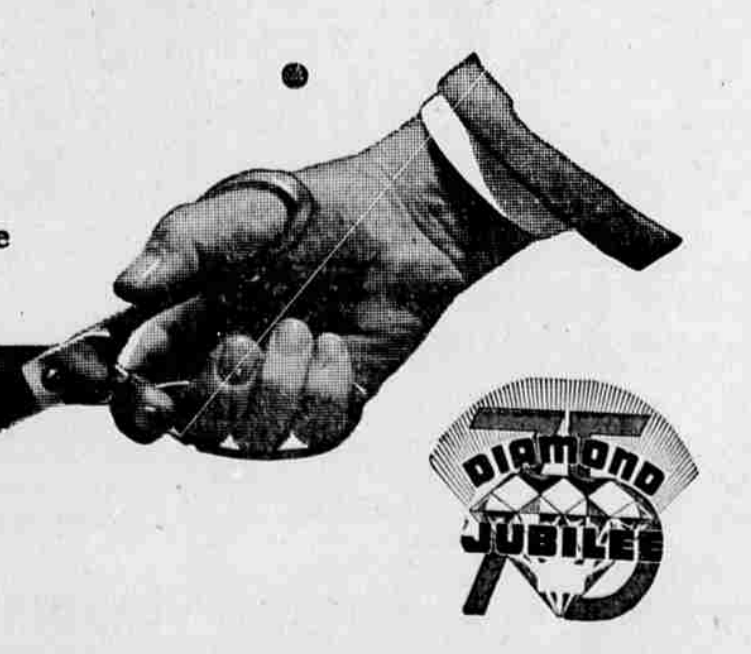
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### ROGUES JOURNEY OVER HILL TODAY
