

PIONEER WOMAN CHIPPEWA FALLS, WIS., TO REWARD

Mrs. Thurza Coleman Buzzell, 84, pioneer of Chippewa Falls, Wis., who had made her home for the past eight years with her daughter, Mrs. James H. Owen of this city, died Friday evening at the Owen home in Siskiyou Heights following a long illness.

She was the wife of the late Francis Marion Buzzell, who died March 22, 1921.

Born in Rochester, N. Y., July 16, 1849, the daughter of Chas. B. and Thurza Coleman of that city, Mrs. Buzzell was educated in that fine old college at Yellow Springs, Ohio, together with her brother, the late Theodore Coleman of Pasadena, Calif., and sister, Miss Emma S. Coleman, now residing in Pasadena, Calif. Another sister, Florence Coleman Bate, died at San Jose, where she was living with her son, Harry Bate, at the time of her demise.

Mrs. Buzzell's father was a pioneer in the field of architecture and building during the very early days. In 1860 the family moved to Chippewa Falls, where Thurza Coleman was married to Francis Marion Buzzell in 1866. To this union were born two daughters and a son: Mrs. D. D. Lockerby of Eau Claire, Wis., who died in 1922, Frank M. Buzzell of Grand Rapids, Mich., and Mrs. Owen of this city.

Funeral services for Mrs. Buzzell will be held in Chippewa Falls, Wis., where interment will take place in the old Coleman family plot.

Following prayer here yesterday afternoon, Mr. Owen accompanied the body to Portland, from which city the remains will be forwarded to the eastern city.

TOLMAN RETURNS FROM INSPECTION HONDURAS MINES

Word has been received here that C. A. Crit Tolman of Seattle, who has been in San Pedro Sula, Republic of Honduras, Central America, in the interest of the Boston Mining company, is returning home. At the present, he is visiting his aunt, Mrs. Laura Anderson Edwards and Dr. F. J. Swanson and family of New York. Mrs. Swanson will be remembered as Ernestine Edwards.

Mr. Tolman is the son of J. C. Tolman and the grandson of Mr. and Mrs. E. J. Anderson and Judge and Mrs. J. C. Tolman, Jackson county pioneers, and is related to Mr. and Mrs. A. B. Anderson of Ashland.

Mr. Tolman left for the Port of Cortes on April 6, from where he sailed to Boston, a letter written from South America states. Referring to the country where he had been since the middle of January, Mr. Tolman stated that he had spent most of the time in the hills about 70 miles southwest of there, examining an old Spanish working.

"Anyone who thinks the early miners did not have a nose for gold should prow around in some of the old workings now inhabited only by a million of bats," he states in the letter. "It is 200 years since the Spaniards worked here."

He goes on to say: "I should say that the year around climate here could not be excelled any place on the globe, that is, if one likes warm weather. It never gets as hot as in the eastern states in the summer and unlike that part of the country is always cool at night. There is never any cold weather, but sometimes during the rainy season, when the sun is not seen, it feels cool by contrast."

"The people are not all a bad lot although they like to play around with revolutions. These revolutions resemble a good football game, plenty of spirit during the game; some are killed of course. After the course is won or lost all settle down to talk it over until the next one, probably some two years hence. The last revolution is now a year old and I missed it. It was said to be a good one and won by my host, Colonel Molony, one of the real soldiers of fortune. Evidently they did some shooting at his home as I have counted 37 rifle shots in the tin roof and more than that in the side of the building facing the street."

DEEP ROGUE POOL REVEALS BODY OF MURDERED YOUTH

GRANTS PASS, May 5—(AP)—Badly decomposed by its long burial in a 40-foot pool of the Rogue river near the scene of the shooting in which Clarence Burke, about 44, is alleged to have twice wounded Martin Jennings, 44, the body of Roland Burr, 23, was to be brought to Grants Pass today.

Burke is sought on a charge of assault with intent to kill Jennings in a rifle affray at Burke's Lookout Point mountain cabin 40 miles northwest of here April 26. Jennings told authorities that Burke shot him twice and then fatally wounded Burr, his mining partner.

No trace of Burr was found on the day following the shooting.

Coroner Virgil Hull returned here late Friday from viewing Burr's body. He said it had been in the river about seven days. Burr had been shot about, the coroner reported, the bullet

let coursing from the right side of the back and out through the chest in front.

Hull left here Friday after receiving a meager report by forest service emergency radio and telephone that the body had been discovered. The coroner brought the remains over mountain trails to a point near Whiskey creek and Glendale, where it was left to be brought out by way of Glendale today.

The condition of the body was such that it could not be transported over the rough route by way of Galice.

Meanwhile the search continued for Burke, who officers believe is still in the mountains. He was reported seen once since the day of the shooting.

Jennings is in the county jail here, held as a material witness.

POPPY DAYS SET FOR MAY 25-26

Proclamation was issued yesterday by Mayor E. M. Wilson, designating May 25th and 26th as Legion Auxiliary and Veterans poppy days for the sale of poppies, made and sold

for special relief of those who participated in military service.

The proclamation closes with "For their devotion to our country may we extend such encouragement as a liberal purchase of these poppies will afford."

A statement was also issued by the American Legion Auxiliary yesterday, announcing that Medford will be called upon to honor the World War dead and give aid to the war's living victims by wearing memorial poppies on May 25 and 26, the Friday and Saturday preceding Memor-

ial Day. These days will be known as "Poppy Days" throughout the United States and will be generally observed by the wearing of the little red flower of Flanders' Field.

Observance of "Poppy Days" here will be directed by the American Legion Auxiliary, Mrs. Walter Oimscheid, president of the local auxiliary unit has announced. Women of the auxiliary will distribute poppies on the streets and receive contributions for the auxiliary's welfare and relief work among the disabled veterans and their families.

Organization of a corps of volunteer workers to distribute the memorial flowers throughout the city is going forward rapidly under the leadership of Mrs. Belva Aiken, chairman of the auxiliary's poppy committee. A large supply of poppies has been ordered from the Portland Veterans hospital, where disabled veterans have been given employment during the winter and spring making the little paper flowers.
