Roxy Is Showing New Type Picture

The story of "The Power and the Glory," now at the Roxy theatre, cannot be separated from the method in which it is told. Through a new medium evolved by Lasky, the film reveals the important events in the life of a man who rises from the most humble beginnings to a position of great power and influence. It shows his change from a simple young man without any education to a figure of national importance with manifold interests and great wealth. It depicts events which make his life a complicated affair of intrigue, adventure and romance.

The new method of screen storytelling is called "narrative" and it is said to preface a new form of motion picture technique. It takes the story out of its usual chronological order and emphasizes only the incidents that are important to the pattern of a lifetime.

OREGON PIONEERS OF CHAMPOEG WIN MARK'S LAUDATION

CHAMPOEG, Ore., May 5.—(AP)—Pages of Oregon's history were turned back to the wagon wheel era as the 91st anniversary of establishment of Uncle Sam's first civil government west of the Rocky mountains was commemorated here today. The small handful of survivors of the gallant band whose vision was responsible for the saving of Oregon for the United States was given honored place. Today's program was under the direction of the sons and daughters of Oregon pioneers. Approximately 1800 persons gathered in memory of the division day of May 2, 1843, when the assembled pioneers voted to turn to the Union Jack. The aspirations and ideals of the Oregon pioneers were eulogized by Willard Marks of Albany, state board of higher education chairman who was the principal speaker. We should strive to return to the old-fashioned principles of elemental honesty and fair dealing, he said. "There is no need to apologize for Oregon," he declared. "Out here on the Pacific coast nature has provided a place for the attainment of the summit of human effort and the maximum of human happiness. It would seem that destiny sent to this country a class of people in the Oregon pioneers who would develop habits, traditions and ideals which would lay the proper foundation for the realization of this potentiality."

Menus of the Day

- By Mrs. Alexander George CHICKEN SHORTCAKE FOR DINNER (Recipe Serves Four) A Dinner Menu. Chicken Dinner. Buttered Asparagus. Stuffed Strawberry Preserves. Bread. Peach Salad. Baked Custards. Cream Coffee. Milk for the Children. German Milk Toast. 3 eggs. 1/2 tsp. salt. 2 tbsps. sugar. 1 cup milk. 3 Shredded Wheat Biscuits. Beat eggs lightly, add salt, sugar and milk; pour into shallow dish; split Shredded Wheat Biscuits and soak halves in milk-egg mixture until soft; cook in a frying pan in hot butter or fat; when browned on one side, turn and brown on the other. Serve sprinkled with powdered sugar, with jelly, or, for dessert, with a sweet sauce. Six portions. Fruit Shortcake. 6 Shredded Wheat Biscuits. 1/2 cup cut fruits or berries. Whipped, sweetened and flavored cream. Heat and split Shredded Wheat Biscuits; on the lower half of each spread whipped cream and cover with fruit; cover with upper half of biscuit; cover with whipped cream and fruit. Six portions. Baked Meat Croquettes. 2 cups chopped meat. 1 small onion, minced. Salt and pepper. 1 egg. 4 Shredded Wheat Biscuits. 2 tbsps. melted fat. Stock or water. Parsley. To meat add onion, salt, pepper and egg; roll biscuits fine; combine with meat mixture and add enough stock or water to make of consistency to shape; form in cones; place in a greased baking dish, brush with fat and bake 20 minutes in a hot oven (425 deg.). Serve with a sprig of parsley stuck in the top of each.

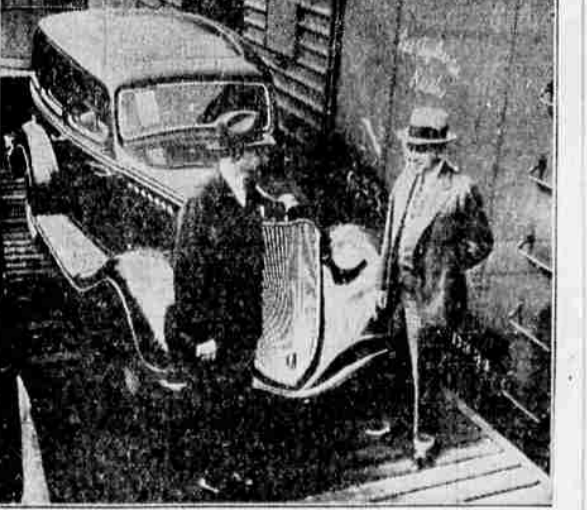
- Stuffed Peach Salads. 4 halves canned peaches. 1/2 cup crushed pineapple. 1/2 cup cottage cheese. 1/2 teaspoon salt. 4 tablespoons salad dressing. Chill ingredients. Mix cheese, salt and pineapple. Stuff peaches and serve on lettuce. Top with dressing. Creamed Chicken Mixture. 4 tablespoons butter. 4 tablespoons flour. 1/4 teaspoon salt. 1/4 teaspoon paprika. 1/2 cup cream. 1 1/2 cups milk. 1 cup diced cooked chicken. 1 tablespoon chopped pimiento. 1 tablespoon chopped celery, cooked. SMOKING CURBS HUNGER'S PANGS CHICAGO — (UP) — Cigarettes may never take the place of a juicy steak, but people who smoke really are eating. According to Dr. James H. Hutton, prominent endocrinologist here, smoking, to a certain extent, is a substitute for food, he said. The explanation: Nicotine is absorbed into the smoker's system and reaches the adrenal glands. The glands are excited by the drug and secrete adrenalin, a hormone. The adrenalin then releases quantities of sugar stored in the body as starch, which temporarily relieves hunger. In explaining how successfully adrenalin can mobilize sugar reserves, Dr. Hutton said that normally there are from 80 to 120 milligrams of sugar in the blood and the use of adrenalin can increase this amount to 180 milligrams.
