

APOSTOLIC FAITH REVIVAL SERVICE WILL OPEN TODAY

Revival services will open today at the Apostolic Faith, 42 North Front street. Rev. R. R. Crawford, assistant overseer from the headquarters at Portland, Oregon, is bringing the Morning Star Quartet, well known in Medford, and other workers, and expects to wage an intensive campaign for souls.

Seventeen years ago Reverend Crawford, with evangelists and musicians, pitched a tent in Grants Pass and opened the first Apostolic Faith meeting in the Rogue River valley. He was impressed with the open-minded folk down in this country, and his efforts were not in vain, for the "penitent form" was filled nightly with seeking souls and many were converted within a few weeks. Soon after, the work was opened in Medford, and special meetings have been held in various sections through the valley during these years, resulting in several hundred converts.

Every few months, Rev. Crawford comes back to help out the local workers, like the old circuit riders in the pioneer days. Though he is still a young man, he has carried the name of "Sky Pilot" for many years, having piloted the Apostolic Faith airplane throughout the northwest for a number of years and was the first minister of the gospel to actually pilot a plane for the express purpose of carrying the gospel.

The Morning Star Quartet has been heard over the radio in the "Chapel Hour," and their friends in Medford will be glad to hear them sing the old songs again, as well as many new ones. Walter Reid sings first tenor; Arthur Hiatt, second tenor; Rev. Crawford, first bass; and George Hughes, second bass. Everyone loves the negro spirituals, so they have a fine collection of these, as well as other hymns of harmony.

The Vesper Concert Trio assists the local orchestra in the congregational music and renders special selections. At the beginning of the Sunday evening service, they give a sacred concert.

The old-time style of evangelism marks these Apostolic Faith meetings. The congregational singing is the good old-time kind and everybody sings. Then there are testimonies, just like they used to have in the good old days; and one tells how he was a drunken traveling man, and how the Man of Galilee sobered him up and helped him to make hundreds of dollars worth of restitution; and another tells how he was converted, though just an ordinary, pleasure-loving young business man; and others tell of the satisfaction they have found in serving God even in

these days of unrest. And so the meetings go on. And then Reverend Crawford takes his Bible and preaches the old-time religion, without any modern ideas or apologies, and tells folks about a Heaven to gain and hell-fire to shun, and of a Gospel of faith and facts. And while his subjects are not pre-announced, they are well selected to meet the need of modern man.

The public is invited to these services, and no collections are ever taken and no one is solicited for funds to carry on this campaign. This is a policy which has been followed by the Apostolic Faith from the beginning, and a collection has never been taken. The hall is well lighted and comfortably seated and a warm welcome is extended to all.

The services are as follows: Sunday, 10:30 a. m. and 7:30 p. m., and every evening (except Monday and Saturday) at 7:45.

Canada To Cut Wheat Acreage

OTTAWA, May 10.—A reduction of 2,112,800 acres in the area intended to be sown to spring wheat in Canada this year, as compared to last year's figures, was estimated in a crop report today of the dominion bureau of statistics.

This would be a reduction of 8 per cent and would bring the spring wheat acreage back to the level of 1928.

ICKES AGAINST O-C PAYMENTS

PORTLAND, Ore., May 10.—(AP)—According to a special to the Oregonian from Washington, Secretary of the Interior Ickes has made an unfavorable report on the McNary-Mott bill to repay Oregon counties under terms of the Oregon and California land grant direct from the treasury.

Mott's bill was submitted to Director of the Budget Douglas. "The proposed legislation is not in accord with the financial program of the president," Ickes quoted Douglas as saying, adding, "accordingly I cannot recommend enactment of the bill."

Without direct payments from the treasury, Oregon counties will be paid only when and if the grant lands and timber are sold.

UNITED'S AIRMEN MAKE MILEAGE

If a motorist drove 10,000 miles a year it would take him 100 years to chalk up 1,000,000 miles. But two pilots of United Air Lines flying in and out of Medford already have passed their million-mile mark in the air in the space of only sixteen years.

Heber C. Miller and Ralph Virden, tallest and shortest pilots on the Pacific coast route of United, who fly three-mile-a-minute Boeing transplants between Seattle, Medford and Oakland, are the veterans. Miller is credited with 9,636 hours, or the equivalent of 1,692,380 miles, and Virden with 9,833 hours, or 1,648,630 miles. They are among twenty pilots on the company's nationwide system who have a million miles or more of flying to their credit.

Spicy Ham Slice (Serving Four)
1 pound slice ham.
16 whole cloves.
1/2 teaspoon cinnamon.
1-3 cup sugar.
1 cup pineapple juice.
1 cup raisins.
1-3 cup water.

Have ham cut about two-thirds inch thick. Stick cloves on one side and fit into shallow baking pan. Top with rest of ingredients. Cover and bake 1 1/2 hours in moderate oven. Inspect frequently and baste well.

Escalloped Corn
2 cups corn.
1 cup cracker crumbs.
1 egg.
1/2 teaspoon salt.
1/2 teaspoon sugar.
1/2 teaspoon paprika.
1/4 teaspoon celery salt.

Chicken A La King
3 tablespoons chicken fat
3 tablespoons flour
2-3 cup chicken stock
2-3 cup milk
1/2 cup diced cooked chicken
1 tablespoon chopped pimientos
1 tablespoon chopped cooked green pepper
1 tablespoon chopped cooked celery
1/4 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon paprika
2 egg yolks

Melt fat and add flour. Blend and add stock and milk. Cook until creamy sauce forms. Stir constantly. Add chicken, seasonings; cook 2 minutes. Add yolks. Mix and serve.

Rice and Veal
1 cup diced cooked veal

2 tablespoons butter
2 tablespoons flour
1 c. milk or veal stock
1 teaspoon chopped onions
1/2 teaspoon chopped green peppers
1/4 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon paprika
1 cup boiled rice
1 cup butter and add flour. Blend and add milk and cook until creamy sauce forms. Add all rest of ingredients. Pour into buttered shallow baking dish and bake 20 minutes.

If leftover gravy available, use 1/2 cup of it for 1/2 cup of milk.

Candied Sweet Potatoes
2 cooked potatoes
3 tablespoons bacon fat
1/2 cup brown sugar
1 tablespoon butter
1/2 cup water

Arrange potatoes in shallow pan. Add rest of ingredients. Cover and bake 20 minutes. Turn frequently. Remove cover, bake 15 minutes.

Spicy Ham Slice (Serving Four)
1 pound slice ham.
16 whole cloves.

Escalloped Corn
2 cups corn.

2 tablespoons butter, melted.
Mix ingredients and pour into buttered baking dish. Bake 25 minutes in moderate hot oven.
Cherry Cake
1 1/2 cups flour.
2 tablespoons baking powder.
1/2 teaspoon salt.
5 tablespoons fat.
1-3 cup sugar.
1 egg.
1/2 cup milk.

Mix dry ingredients. Cut in fat with knife. Mixing with knife add egg and milk. Mix lightly. Pour into greased shallow pan. Cover with cherry mixture.

Cherry Mixture
1 1/2 cups cherries.
1/2 cup sugar.
1/4 teaspoon flour.
1/4 teaspoon cinnamon.
3 tablespoons butter.

Mix ingredients. Spread on soft dough. Bake 25 minutes in moderate oven. Serve warm or cold.

Tomato Cheese Squares
12 pieces buttered bread.
12 slices tomatoes.
12 slices cheese.
12 pieces bacon.
6 tablespoons catsup.

Cover bread with tomatoes, cheese and bacon. Place on shallow pan and brown well until bacon is crisp and bread is toasted.

Trifle, American Style
6 slices sponge cake
4 eggs
1/2 cup sugar
1/4 teaspoon flour
1/4 teaspoon salt
3 cups milk
1/2 teaspoon vanilla
1/4 teaspoon almond extract
4 tablespoons raspberry jam
2 egg whites
5 tablespoons confectioner's sugar

Trifle, American Style
6 slices sponge cake
4 eggs
1/2 cup sugar
1/4 teaspoon flour
1/4 teaspoon salt
3 cups milk
1/2 teaspoon vanilla
1/4 teaspoon almond extract
4 tablespoons raspberry jam
2 egg whites
5 tablespoons confectioner's sugar

Trifle, American Style
6 slices sponge cake
4 eggs
1/2 cup sugar
1/4 teaspoon flour
1/4 teaspoon salt
3 cups milk
1/2 teaspoon vanilla
1/4 teaspoon almond extract
4 tablespoons raspberry jam
2 egg whites
5 tablespoons confectioner's sugar

Beat eggs, add sugar which has been mixed with flour. Add salt, milk. Cook in double boiler until mixture thickens a little. Stir constantly. Place sponge cake in shallow dish. Cover with custard mixture. Beat whites until stiff. Add confectioner's sugar, beat until creamy. Roughly spread on custard. Spread with jam. Bake 3 minutes in hot oven to brown top. Cool and chill.

Ham Biscuits
2 cups flour
4 teaspoons baking powder
1/2 teaspoon salt
4 tablespoons lard
1/2 cup milk

Mix dry ingredients. Cut in lard with knife. Mixing with knife add milk. When soft dough forms, pat it out until 1/4 inch thick. Spread with ham mixture. Roll up like jelly roll. Cut of 1/2 inch slices and arrange flat side up next to each other in a shallow greased pan. Bake 15 minutes.

Ham Filling
1 cup chopped cooked ham
1 tablespoon chopped pickle
1 teaspoon chopped onion
1/2 teaspoon chopped celery
2 tablespoons cream

Mix ingredients and spread on dough.
