

KLAMATH DEMOS SCORE MAHONEY A TROUBLE MAKER

KLAMATH FALLS, May 10.—(Sp.)—At a meeting sponsored by the Martin-for-Governor club here last night, a resolution presented by E. S. Veitch was accepted by unanimous vote. It read:

"Whereas, Willis E. Mahoney came to Klamath Falls about two and one half years ago; and

"Whereas, the said Willis E. Mahoney was elected mayor of Klamath Falls on promises which have not been kept; and

"Whereas, the said Willis E. Mahoney as mayor has kept the city of Klamath Falls in turmoil and strife throughout his administration and created ill feeling and hatred among its citizens; and

"Whereas, the said Willis E. Mahoney now seeks to be elected governor of the state of Oregon on promises that will not be kept; be it

"Resolved, the Democrats of Klamath Falls duly assembled in lawful meeting that we hereby go on record condemning Willis E. Mahoney and his tactics and hereby call on the Democratic voters of Klamath county and the state of Oregon to do everything within their power to defeat Willis E. Mahoney for the Democratic nomination for governor, and we hereby warn the voters that if Willis E. Mahoney is made governor he will throughout his term of office keep the administration of state affairs in turmoil and create strife the same as he has done as mayor of Klamath Falls."
