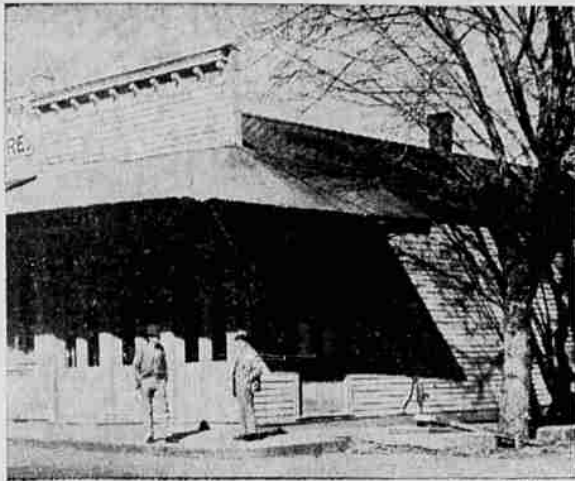

Oldest Bank Attraction For Visitors at Jubilee

Established in 1853, the Beekman bank in Jacksonville, Or., bears the reputation of being the oldest bank in Oregon and will be one of the attractions of Oregon's Diamond Jubilee celebration in Medford and Jacksonville, June 3 to 9, observing Oregon's 75th anniversary of statehood. The interior of the bank is much the same as it was when gold dust from the nearby hills poured over the counters 70 years ago. A bench

where customers used to wait is still the same, including the little racks which had been placed in the wood to prevent whittlers from exercising their knives. Ancient signs continue to adorn the walls.

The bank will be open throughout the week and will be one of the numerous attractions of jubilee week, the activities of which include Medford and Ashland in the presentation of parades, pageants and dozens of special attractions, filling up every hour of the seven-day observance.

SALES TAX CUTS NORTH CAROLINA PROPERTY TAXES

PORTLAND, Ore.—(Sp.)—Property taxes in North Carolina have been reduced 35 per cent during the last year, due to the sales tax and the generous support of farmers, home owners, and industries as a result, according to an official letter authorized by Governor Ehringhaus of North Carolina and released today for publication by the School Relief and Property Tax Reduction League of Oregon.

Since the legislature enacted the sales act to relieve property tax-payers of their too heavy burden, last year a total of \$4,216,561.55 has been collected. The only opposition to the act, it is stated, is from merchants who do not like to collect it, but says the letter, their opposition now rapidly disappearing as the beneficial effects of the tax grows.

"We consider the sales tax successful in this state," declares the letter which was signed by Harry McMullan, state director of assessments and collections. "It has immediately balanced our budget, restored our credit, reduced taxes on property, and saved our schools from almost certain collapse."

"We do not contemplate that our legislature would be willing to go back to the property tax in lieu of the present system. Property still carries a heavy burden on account of debt service liability."

In releasing the North Carolina letter, the Oregon league pointed out that every state reporting thus far, shows that schools have been kept open and property taxes heavily reduced, because the sales tax adds hundreds of thousands of otherwise tax-free citizens to the tax rolls.

SIX ARRESTED ON TRAFFIC CHARGES IN MEDFORD AREA

Six arrests were made in and near Medford yesterday by the local state police. Two were on charges of operating a motor vehicle while under the influence of intoxicating liquor, one for operating with no license, one for speeding, and two for driving with four in the front seat.

Earl R. Woolridge, cook at the blitar rust control camp at Prospect, arrested on the Pacific highway south of Medford for driving while under the influence of liquor, was lodged in the county jail.

George Weir, arrested in Rogue River for the same offense, was brought to Medford handcuffed and also lodged in the county jail.

F. T. Schuler of Treka, Calif., charged with speeding in a heavily loaded truck, was arrested on the Pacific highway south of Medford and cited to appear in justice court today. He was traveling 45 miles per hour, police say.

Arrested on charges of driving with four persons over 12 years of age in the driver's compartment, in Jacksonville yesterday, Elbert G. Hunt was brought to Medford and is to appear before Justice of the Peace W. R. Coleman tomorrow.

Dick Poole, from the CCC camp on the upper Rogue, was arrested yesterday on North Riverside for operating a motor vehicle without a license, and cited to appear in court on or before May 19.

PERCY FORD OF OREGONIAN DIES

PORTLAND, May 14.—(AP)—Charles P. (Percy) Ford, 38, night editor of the Oregonian, Portland, died Sunday in a hospital here, following a long illness and a major operation performed last month. Born in Winnipeg, Canada, Ford came to Portland as a boy and took

a job as mail clerk and office boy for the Oregonian. He has been in the paper's service since that time, with the exception of the World War period, when he served in the trenches, rising from the ranks to top sergeant. For the past six years, he had been head of the Oregonian copy desk. Ford was known as one of the fastest and most skillful head writers in the northwest.

Ford is survived by his wife, two young children, his mother and a brother, all of Portland.

Evangelist Trio Five Irish Night For Methodists

All members of the trio were born in Ireland. They informed the audience that one night during each campaign they devote to the song, music and story of their native land.

He said that Ireland although a very small country, has had more printers ink expended upon it than any other country. The people, their problems and politics are much misunderstood by outsiders, very little real truth is known about its history. He hopes tonight to clarify in the minds of his hearers some of the most prevalent questions.

Miss Evangeline Duff will give a reading, famous among Irish poetry. She will also play several selections upon her vibra-harp. These also will be numbers of the Emerald Isle.

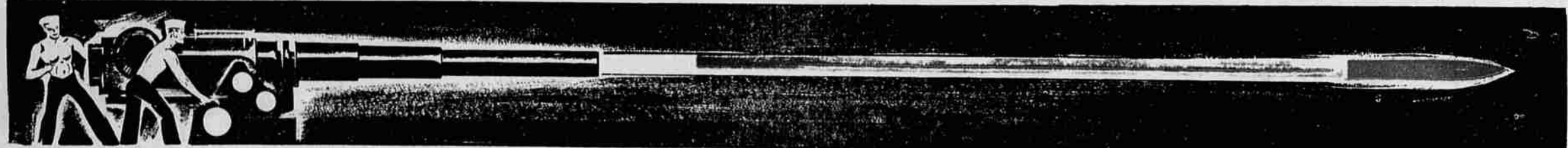
