RUM NATIONALIZATION URGED TO CURE FAULTS WASHINGTON, May 16.—(AP)—Nationalization of the liquor industry was urged today before the house by Representative Hoepfel (D. Cal.).

He suggested appointment of a non-partisan commission to control manufacture, distribution and sale of beer, wine and liquor.

"The unrestricted sale of liquor, with the increasing number of accidents and infractions of law traceable to its unbridled use," Hoepfel said, "is becoming a national menace, just as is the unrestricted sale of firearms to whomsoever has the price."

BANDIT BARROW SAYS EX-PAL YELLOW PUNK DALLAS, Texas, May 16.—(AP)—Raymond Hamilton was branded as a "killer and a yellow punk" in a letter purporting to be written by his former partner in crime, the desperado, Clyde Barrow, received today by Winter King, assistant district attorney here.

The letter, typewritten illegitimately on a telegraph blank, was signed "X. Clyde," and in the lower right hand corner appeared a smudged thumb print of Barrow.
