Southern Oregon league will swing into its fourth week Sunday with the league-leading Medford Rogues hopping to Klamath Falls to play the Shaw-Bertram Lumber Co. team of that city and the Ewuana Box Co. of Klamath Falls traveling to Grants Pass to battle Ken Williams' Merchants.

Jack Hughes, who did such a fine relief pitching job against Ewuana last week, limiting the Klamath club to a pair of runs and three hits in 5 2-3 innings, may start on the mound for Hal Haight's Rogues. In case he does, Cliff McLean will probably be shifted to third base. Dean Joy will do the receiving.

For Shaw-Bertram, Gilman or Stanish will hurl. Two weeks ago, Stanish set back Grants Pass, 2-1, and Haight expects a tough time for his Rogues.

Ehrlart for Grants Pass. Lefty Ehrlart will undoubtedly do the twirling for the second place Grants Pass Merchants. He turned in such a nice game against Shaw-Bertram Sunday that Williams will probably reward him with the starting assignment before his local supporters. Al Droulette will take care of the catching duties.

Carlstrom, the hard luck boy, will be on the mound for Ewuana, with Blaine behind the bat. Medford One Inning Team.

Medford, so far this year, is decidedly a one-inning team. Every game the Rogues have won has been sewed up by a terrific rally in one lone frame, usually along in the latter stages of the game and when they are behind.

Grants Pass last Sunday suddenly unleashed the vicious power that has been idle in the first three weeks of play. Led by the mighty Droulette, they blasted out 18 hits and a lot of them for extra bases, to score 14 runs for the first real hitting exhibition they have put on.

Two Team Race. The way the teams stack up now, it appears that it is a two-team race with Medford and Grants Pass the class of the circuit. Shaw-Bertram is well fixed for pitchers, but to date has shown a decidedly weak hitting team.

ANGELS INCREASE LEAGUE LEAD BY DEFEATING REDS

(By the Associated Press.) Closely-contested series throughout the Pacific Coast league appeared the rule today as every team except Hollywood and the San Francisco Seals continued to alternate victory and defeat.

Los Angeles increased its lead to five full games at the expense of the second place San Francisco Mission, handing Clarence Mitchell, veteran pitcher, his first defeat in eight starts this season. With the score tangled at one-all, the Angels found Mitchell for three hits to score as many runs and win yesterday's encounter, 4 to 1.

The Hollywood Stars won their second straight game against the Seals, 12 to 2, succeeding them in third place by half a game. Sam Gibson, ace hurler of the Seals, was driven to the showers in the third inning, after the invaders had scored five runs.

The Seattle Indians won from the Sacramento Senators, 8 to 6, after the Senators had piled up a four-run lead in the first inning. Leo Pittner, who relieved Howard Craghead on the Indian mound in the second inning, allowed the Senators only five hits and two runs for the rest of the route.

A ninth inning rally brought Oakland two runs and a 3 to 2 victory over Portland. The Oaks were held scoreless until the sixth inning.

BROWNS BECOME LEAGUE FACTOR UNDER HORNSBY

St. Louis Outfit Thumps Easterners, 4 Out of 5 Times On Tour and Take Sixth Place in Standing

Stimulated by the influence and example of Manager Rogers Hornsby, the St. Louis Browns have begun to assume a threatening attitude toward their American league rivals. After a bad start which allowed them to remain out of the cellar only because of the Chicago White Sox were even less successful, the Browns wound up their recent eastern tour with a flourish of four victories in their last five games. Returning home yesterday they avenged two defeats in Boston by trimming the Red Sox 4 to 3, moved ahead of the losers into sixth place in the standing, virtually tied with Washington for the next higher notch.

Tigers Also Advance. The Detroit Tigers made the only Western club, starting their home

Tigers beat out the league-leading Yankees 5 to 4 to give Tommy Bridges his first triumph over New York and moved into third place. The White Sox shoved Philadelphia down to fourth by defeating the A's 7 to 2 in their first home game under Jimmy Dykes' management.

Cleveland's Indians spotted Washington four runs in the first two innings, then cut loose with a 17-hit attack on four Senator pitchers that produced seven runs in the seventh and a final score of 14 to 6.

Cubs Regain Lead. The Cubs regained the National league lead in their first game in the east as Chuck Klein socked his tenth and eleventh homers and led the way to a 10-3 triumph over the Phillies. Pittsburgh dropped to second when Earl Grace made a wild throw past first trying for a double play in the tenth inning of a hurling duel between Van Mungo and Bill Swift and the error gave Brooklyn a 2 to 1 decision.

The St. Louis-New York struggle for third place remained unchanged as both clubs won. The Cards defeated Boston 5 to 3 as Virgil Davis and Manager Frank Frisch hit homers to back Paul Dean in his third pitching triumph. Big Fred Fitzsimmons pitched and batted the Giants to a 6 to 3 victory over Cincinnati, giving only four hits in the first seven innings and helping out with a homer.

BELCASTRO TAKES FRENCHMAN WITH ROUGH GRAPPLING

In the main event of the mat card at the Armory last night, after Walt Sirola, scientific grappler from France, had given him everything but the war debt, Pete Belcastro, Sacramento scrapper, came through with a rolling scissors to take the deciding fall, and leave his recent streak of wins unbroken.

The 187-pound Belcastro dropped the first fall in nine minutes when the beefy Sirola applied five flying headlocks and gave the Italian such a headache that he couldn't keep his shoulders off the mat. The belligerent Pete came back fast in the second and gave Sirola so much slugging, kneeling and choking that he got into an argument with Referee Ray Frisbie. The Frenchman Sonnenberghed him when he wasn't looking, but Belcastro was plenty mad and pinned Sirola to the canvas with a body press to even the score.

For the third fall, the Italian went in slugging, and aimed one wide whacker at Frisbie, but quieted down when the Frenchman went to work with whip wristlocks and chiropractic headlocks that left Belcastro in a daze. He snapped out of it just in time, however, and met Sirola halfway with a rolling scissors that en-

abled him to pin the 180-pound Frenchman to the canvas for the deciding fall.
